A. Purpose

Notice of Intent To Prepare an Environmental Impact Statement and To Announce Public Scoping Meetings for the Fallon Range Training Complex Modernization: Expansion of Land Ranges, Airspace Modifications, and Public Land Withdrawal Renewal

AGENCY: Department of the Navy, DoD. ACTION: Notice.

SUMMARY: Pursuant to Section 102(2)(c) of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, as implemented by the Council on Environmental Quality Regulations (40 Code of Federal Regulations parts 1500–1508), the Department of the Navy (DoN) announces its intent to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental consequences of maintaining and modernizing the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC) in Nevada, which would include land range expansion through additional land withdrawal and land acquisition, airspace modifications, and public land withdrawal renewal. The Navy's action proponent for this proposal is Commander, United States Pacific Fleet (PACFLT). The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the United States Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: Since the initial operation of Naval Air Station Fallon in the 1940s and the formal establishment of the FRTC in 1977, the ranges and airspace of the FRTC have been extensively used by the DoN and other Services to conduct air warfare and ground training, including live-fire training activities. The FRTC is the DoN's premier integrated strike warfare training complex, supporting combat elements of PACFLT, United State (U.S.) Fleet Forces Command, U.S. Marine Corps, Naval Special Warfare Command, and others. It is located in the high desert of northern Nevada, 65 miles east of the city of Reno, Nevada, and is comprised of: Special Use Airspace (SUA), including restricted areas, Military Operations Areas (MOAs), and Air Traffic Control Assigned Airspace (ATCAAs); land training ranges; fixed and mobile land targets, and control facilities; threat electronic warfare, early warning radars, and surface-to-air missile systems; and instrumentation facilities.

The current FRTC bombing ranges (B-16, B-17, B-19, and B-20) have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s. However, warfare technology, to include dynamic improvements to stand-off weapons, platform sensors, threat systems, and strike tactics, and the accuracy of applications that produce and manage safety footprints for air-to-ground weapons training, have continued to evolve. In response to these changes, and to formalize FRTC training requirements, the Naval Aviation Warfighting Development Center (the DoN's primary authority on naval aviation training and tactics development), together with subject matter training experts from the Naval Special Warfare Command, conducted a training capabilities study. This study analyzed the capabilities that should be provided at the FRTC to meet evolving DoN training needs in air warfare, strike warfare, and Naval special warfare. It concluded that training capabilities currently available at the FRTC do not, and will not, meet the real-world training needs identified by Fleet and Unified Commanders, Therefore, to minimize the identified shortcoming and provide the responsive and realistic training capabilities needed to meet evolving aviation and ground training requirements, PACFLT proposes to maintain and modernize the capabilities of the FRTC, including its land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would have the benefit of maintaining and enhancing

the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure. PACFLT's proposed action includes the renewal of the existing 202,859-acre public land withdrawal that expires on November 6, 2021; the withdrawal and reservation for military use of approximately 604,744 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges; acquisition of approximately 65,160 acres of non-

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federal land to expand existing land ranges; expansion of associated SUA, as well as reconfiguration of existing airspace; and modification of range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization. The aviation and ground training to be conducted in the modernized FRTC would be of the same general types and at the same tempos as analyzed by PACFLT in Alternative 2 of the Final EIS for Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada (December 2015). Specific details concerning the proposed land expansion and SUA reconfiguration may be found on the project Web site at

www.FRTCModernization.com. The EIS will also assess the potential environmental effects of the no action alternative. Under the no action alternative, there would be no renewal of the existing land withdrawal, which expires on November 6, 2021, and there would be no range expansion, airspace changes, or modification of range infrastructure. As a result, the DoN would reassess the military mission of NAS Fallon and the FRTC.

In addition to the proposed action and the no action alternative, the EIS will also assess the potential environmental effects of other action alternatives. Public comments submitted during the scoping process will inform PACFLT's development of other action alternatives for analysis in the EIS.

Federal agencies, state agencies, local agencies, Native American Tribes and Nations, and interested persons are encouraged to provide comments to PACFLT to identify specific community interests, issues, or topics of environmental concern that PACFLT should consider in the EIS. Resource areas to be addressed in the EIS will include soils; air quality/climate; water quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and the protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: In continuance of the Navy's commitment to responsible stewardship of the marine environment and building upon analyses and information included in the Navy's 2001 Final Overseas Environmental Impact Statement/ Environmental Impact Statement (OEIS/ EIS) published in the Federal Register on January 26, 2001 (66 FR 8788), 2007 Final Supplemental EIS (SEIS) published in the Federal Register on May 4, 2007 (72 FR 25302), 2012 Final SEIS/SOEIS published in the Federal Register on June 8, 2012 (77 FR 34041), and 2015 Final SEIS/SOEIS published in the Federal Register on January 30, 2015 (80 FR 5109), the Navy has prepared a comprehensive assessment of the potential environmental impacts associated with continued employment of SURTASS LFA sonar systems. The Navy proposes to continue employing up to four SURTASS LFA sonar systems onboard up to four Navy surveillance ships for routine training, testing, and military operations in the Pacific, Atlantic, and Indian oceans and the Mediterranean Sea, including certain geographic limitations on

SUMMARY: The Department of the Navy (DON) has filed an application to extend the current withdrawal of public lands from all forms of appropriation under the public land laws, including the mining laws, the mineral leasing laws, and the geothermal leasing laws, subject to valid existing rights, for military use of the Naval Air Station (NAS) Fallon, Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC) in Churchill County, Nevada (withdrawal extension). The DON has also requested the withdrawal of approximately 604,789 additional acres of public lands from all forms of appropriation under the public land laws, including the mining laws, the mineral leasing laws, and the geothermal leasing laws, subject to valid existing rights (withdrawal expansion). This notice temporarily segregates the 604,789 acres from all forms of appropriation under the public land laws, including the mining laws, the mineral leasing laws, and the geothermal leasing laws, for 2 years; gives the public an opportunity to comment on the proposed withdrawal extension and withdrawal expansion; and announces the date, time, and

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: Pursuant to section 3016 of the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for Fiscal Year 2000, Pub. L. 106-65, the Department of the Navy (DON) has filed an application to extend the current withdrawal of public lands from all forms of appropriation under the public land laws, including the mining laws, the mineral leasing laws (except for approximately 68,804 acres in the Dixie Valley Training Area which is currently included in the overall withdrawal but not withdrawn from the mineral leasing laws), and the geothermal leasing laws, subject to valid existing rights, for military use of the Naval Air Station (NAS) Fallon, Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC) in Churchill County, Nevada. The lands are currently withdrawn under the Military Lands Withdrawal Act of 1999, which is part

of the NDAA for Fiscal Year 2000, which reserves these lands for defenserelated purposes for a period of 20 years. Unless Congress extends the withdrawal, it will expire on November 5, 2021.

In addition to the DON's request that the current withdrawal be extended, the DON filed an application requesting the withdrawal and reservation of additional public lands for military training exercises involving the NAS Fallon at Fallon, Churchill County, Nevada. The application to expand the acreage of lands withdrawn for the Navy's use at Fallon seeks the withdrawal of approximately 604,789 additional acres of public lands from all forms of appropriation under the public land laws, including the mining laws, the mineral leasing laws, and the geothermal leasing laws, subject to valid

existing rights. In addition, the application seeks to extend the existing withdrawal of 68,804 acres in the Dixie Valley Training Area (DVTA). Pursuant to Section 3011 of the NDAA for Fiscal Year 2000, the FRTC DVTA acres are currently withdrawn from all forms of appropriation under the public land laws, including the mining and geothermal leasing laws, but not withdrawn from the mineral leasing laws. This application seeks the withdrawal of these 68,804 acres of the DVTA from the mineral leasing laws, subject to valid existing rights. The DON's requested 604,789 expansion acres do not include the 68,804 DVTA acres, as the DVTA acres are already withdrawn from the other public land laws, and reserved for DON use

As required by section 204(b)(1) of the Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976 (FLPMA), 43 U.S.C 1714(b)(1), and the BLM regulations at 43 CFR part 2300, the BLM is publishing this Notice of the DON applications. While the BLM and the Department of the Interior (DOI) assist the DON with the processing of withdrawal applications, and the Secretary of the Interior makes a recommendation to Congress on proposed withdrawals, it will be Congress, not the Secretary of the Interior, that will make the final decision on the requested extension and expansion of the existing NAS Fallon withdrawal.

Four management alternatives Alternatives A through D, are analyzed in the FEIS. Alternative A, the no-action alternative, would continue current management practices related to resources, visitor use, park operations, and maintenance of facilities within the Moose-Wilson corridor. Alternatives B through D address increases in traffic and volume-related congestion on the Moose-Wilson Road during peak use periods by either restricting its use as a through-travel route or limiting the number of vehicles entering the corridor at any one time.

Alternative B emphasizes managing the corridor as a visitor destination. Reduced crowding on Moose-Wilson Road and at destinations within the corridor would provide visitors an opportunity for self-discovery. This would be accomplished by restricting through-traffic in either direction during peak use periods through the management of a gate system on Moose Wilson Road within the Laurance S. SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: Greater Sage-Grouse is a state-managed species that is dependent on sagebrush steppe ecosystems. These ecosystems are managed in partnership across the range of the Greater Sage-Grouse by federal, state, and local authorities. Efforts to conserve the species and its habitat date back to the 1950s. Over the past two decades, state wildlife agencies, federal agencies, and many others in the range of the species have been collaborating to conserve Greater Sage-Grouse and its habitats. The United States Department of the Interior (DOI) and the BLM have broad responsibilities to manage federal lands and resources for the public benefit. Nearly half of Greater Sage Grouse habitat is managed by the BLM. The BLM is committed to being a good neighbor and investing in on-the-ground conservation activities through close collaboration with State governments, local communities, private landowners, and other stakeholders.

In September 2015, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) determined that the Greater Sage-Grouse did not warrant listing under the Endangered Species Act of 1973. The USFWS based its "not warranted" determination, in part, on the conservation commitments and management actions in the BLM

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Greater Sage-Grouse land use plan amendments and revisions (2015 GRSG land use plan decisions), as well as on other private, state, and federal conservation efforts. Since 2015 the BLM, in discussion with partners primarily Governors and state wildlife management agencies, recognized that several refinements and policy updates could help strengthen conservation efforts, while providing increased economic opportunity to local communities. The BLM seeks to improve management alignment in ways that will increase management flexibility, maintain access to public resources, and promote conservation outcomes. The BLM used internal, agency, and public scoping to identify issues considered in the environmental analysis. As part of this analysis, the BLM also examined the range of alternatives evaluated in the BLM's 2015 GRSG land use plan decisions and their supporting NEPA

analyses This Draft RMP Amendment/Draft EIS is one of six separate planning efforts that are being undertaken in response to SO 3353, Greater Sage-Grouse Conservation and Cooperation with Western States (June 7, 2017), and in accordance with SO 3349, American Energy Independence (March 29, 2017). The Draft RMP Amendment/Draft EIS proposes to amend the RMPs for field offices on BLM lands within BLM Wyoming boundaries. The planning area includes nearly 60 million acres of BLM, National Park Service, U.S. Forest Service, U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, State, local, and private lands located in Wyoming, in 20 counties: Albany, Bighorn, Campbell, Carbon, Converse, Crook, Fremont, Hot Springs, Johnson, Lincoln, Natrona, Niobrara, Park, Sheridan, Sublette, Sweetwater, Teton, Uinta, Washakie. and Weston. Within the decision area, the BLM administers more than 18 million acres of public lands, providing approximately 17 million acres of Priority and General GRSG habitat. The DoN is not proposing to change the level or type of training, rather activities would be redistributed across the expanded ranges. The DoN will hold seven public meetings to inform the public and receive oral and written comments on the Draft EIS. This notice announces the dates and locations of the public meetings and provides information about the environmental planning effort. Equal weight will be given to oral and written statements. The DoN is also working with thirteen federally recognized Native American tribes and one Tribal Council.

The FRTC is a training complex in the high desert of northern Nevada encompassing airspace, land ranges, and electronic systems used primarily for air and ground training activities. The DoN's proposed action is to modernize the FRTC by expanding land ranges and modifying associated airspace configurations. The proposed action has the following elements:

 Congressional renewal of the 1999 public land withdrawal of 202,864 acres which is scheduled to expire in November 2021.

 Withdrawal and reservation by Congress for military use of up to approximately 618,727 acres of additional federal land.

 Acquisition of approximately 65,153 acres of private or state-owned (non-federal) land.

 Expansion of associated special use airspace and reconfiguration of existing airspace.

 Modification of range infrastructure to support modernization, including construction of new targets.

The purpose of the proposed action is to provide sustainable and modernized airspace, range, maneuver areas, training facilities, and range infrastructure and resources that would support acceptably realistic air warfare training activities as well as special operations ground training activities in order to meet emergent and future threats. The proposed action would enable the DoN's execution of its congressionally mandated roles and responsibilities under 10 United States Code (U.S.C), section 5062 and 10 U.S.C. 167. Current range configurations do not support realistic training.

Increasing the size of the range would allow the DoN to realistically train with precision-guided munitions, which require greater safety buffer zones because they are launched from aircraft at higher altitudes and longer distances from targets. It would also allow ground forces to realistically conduct tactical ground mobility training.

II. Information on the Undertaking*

 Describe the undertaking and nature of federal involvement (if multiple federal agencies are involved, specify involvement of each):

The Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet, a command of the U.S. Navy ("Navy"), proposes to modernize the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC) by expanding land ranges and modifying associated airspace configurations. The Proposed Action would have the following elements:

- Congressional renewal of the 1999 Public Land Withdrawal of 202,864 acres which is scheduled to expire in November 2021
- withdrawal and reservation by Congress for military use approximately 618,727 acres of additional federal land for military use
- acquisition of approximately 65,153 acres of private or state-owned (non-federal) land
- expansion of associated Special Use Airspace (SUA) and reconfiguration of existing airspace
- modification of range infrastructure to support modernization

The Navy is not proposing to change the level or type of aviation or ground training from what has been previously analyzed in 2015.

Actions associated with proposal include:

- Development of new target areas within B16 and 17 Ranges
- · Development of new electronic warfare sites (final locations to be determined)
- · Re-route of State Highway 361 (location yet to be determined)
- · Re-route of Paiute Pipeline (location yet to be determined)
- · Construction of Range Fences (locations to be determined)

The number of federal agencies involved has not been completely identified. The US Navy will be involved in the majority of the projects. The BLM will be involved in the approval of the rights-of-way associated with the proposed movement State Highway 361 and Paiute Pipeline. They will also likely be involved in the approval of the locations of fenceline. The role of additional federal agencies involved in the movement of State Highway361 and Pipeline has yet to be determined.

7. Describe the Area of Potential Effects:

36CFR800.16 defines the Area of Potential Effect (APE) as the "geographic area or areas within which an undertaking may directly or indirectly cause alterations in the character or use of historic properties, if any such properties exist. The area of potential effect is influenced by the scale and nature of an undertaking and may be different for different kinds of effects caused by the undertaking".

36CFR800.5 identifies that the introduction of visual, atmospheric or audible elements that diminish the integrity of the properties significance as a potential adverse effect. The Navy recognizes that the noise and vibration associated with the routine operation of its aircraft within its special use air space (Enclosure 1) could have a possible indirect affect that may adversely affect a historic properties eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places.

The Navy has had multiple discussions with various tribes related to the potential effects of Navy operations and has received comments from members of the public and Federal Agencies related to the potential effects associated with Navy operations. Based on those discussions and comments the Navy has determined the APE for this undertaking is approximately 10,452,796 acres in size the approximate size of the special use air space assigned to NAS Fallon by the Federal Aviation Administration (Attachment 1). The discontinuous chunk of air space shown in the enclosed map is connected to the remainder of the airspace by a transit corridor used by the military and civilian aircraft operating in the area. The APE as defined will cover all known actions including those that are reasonably foreseeable or cumulative.

8. Describe steps taken to identify historic properties:

To following steps have been taken by the Navy to identify Historic properties

 Has conducted (2) Class I inventories (Identification of previous inventories and identification cultural properties

- Conducted 66,000 acres of inventory and recorded 855 sites. Preliminary assessments have been made
- Conducted background research to identify those sites that have been formally evaluated as Traditional Cultural Properties and those that may someday be recorded and evaluated as sacred or Traditional Cultural Properties.

Have conducted meetings with four tribes related to the identification of cultural properties within the APE (have reached out to 14 other tribes but have not received response). The next meeting is scheduled for February 28, 2019.

Sent the first report documenting the findings of a 12,000 acre CRM inventory to four tribes that have been actively participating in process and asked for comment. No response has been received though the Navy has asked for them several times. The second report documenting the results of 48,000 acres of inventory is due March 1, 2019.

 Describe the historic property (or properties) and any National Historic Landmarks within the APE (or attach documentation or provide specific link to this information):

There are no known Historic Landmarks within the APE. A number of inventories related to new target areas have been completed but formal determinations of eligibility have not been consulted on yet.

Sites likely to be considered eligible include Salt Cave and a series of three smaller caves all of which contain petroglyphs located, an isolated petroglyph panel located on boulder and several temporary habitation sites.

10. Describe the undertaking's effects on historic properties:

The undertaking is expected to have adverse effects on several properties likely to be considered eligible located in target areas. Based on available data some limited habitation sites will be adversely affected. Additional adverse effects may occur further out in association with the construction of fencelines; the relocations of the Paiute Pipeline and State Highway 361; and infrastructure projects yet to be identified.

11. Explain how this undertaking would adversely affect historic properties (include information on any conditions or future actions known to date to avoid, minimize, or mitigate adverse effects):

Early on in the process there was an attempts by the Navy to avoid having adverse effects on any potential historic properties. When the several of the proposed target areas were dropped and relocated, however in several cases after a reconnaissance of the area it would be impossible to relocate with having an impact on a cultural property located in the new area.

While no formal mitigation has been determined beyond data recovery the Navy is considering several suggestions proffered by the tribes and BLM related to mitigation which include formal recordation of locations that could be TCPs located under the installations special use space and a suggestion by the tribes to contact with them to conduct an ethno graphic study of the installations ranges and the installation of a system that monitors airspeed and identifies aircraft out in the Reese River Valley (would cover Yomba Reservation and town of Austin). Additionally, the

Navy is planning to formalize access to the installations ranges for the tribes through the development of an MOA.

08/25/16 A notice to prepare an environmental impact statement sent to (18) tribes. The notice describes the undertaking, invites them to participate in the scoping process, provide comments, and initiates the consultation process.

12/19/16: Walker River Reservation responds to earlier letter and presentation held at NAS Fallon in October 2016. Tribes confirms it willingness to consult on the EIS; however, they note that while they sent a representative along with four other tribes the meeting should not be considered consultation as consultation by their definition requires the presence of all council members. Inclosing they express their interest in being a cooperating agency; participating in the EIS with other cooperating agencies, and look forward to government to government consultation.

1/17-9/17 Navy visits five reservations that requested presentations on the EIS (Duckwater, Yomba, Walker River, Fallon and Pyramid Lake).

On February 12, 2019, the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) received your notification of adverse effect for the referenced undertaking that was submitted in accordance with Section 800.6(a)(1) of our regulations, "Protection of Historic Properties" (36 CFR Part 800). The background documentation included with your submission did not include all of the required information specified in Section 800.11(e) of the ACHP's regulations. We, therefore, are unable to determine whether Appendix A of the regulations, *Criteria for Council Involvement in Reviewing Individual Section 106 Cases*, applies to this undertaking. Accordingly, we request that you submit the following additional information so that we can determine whether our participation in the consultation to resolve adverse effects is warranted.

 We would appreciate an explanation of why Naval Air Station (NAS) Fallon's definition of the undertaking regarding the Fallon Training Range Complex (FRTC) Modernization did not include the Land Withdrawal Case Files under the Federal Land Policy Management Act (FLPMA).

The ACHP understands that the Military Lands Withdrawal Act of 1999 (Public Law 106-65) withdrew 202,864 acres of federal land for use within the FRTC which is set to expire in November 2021. We are aware that the Department of the Air Force is also considering the extension and expansion of land withdrawal for use within the Nevada Test and Training Range (NTTR) in accordance with Public Law 106-65. While these actions are separate, they are similar, and the ACHP wishes to be consistent in its recommendations to the both agencies.

The Commander, United States Pacific Fleet, proposes to modernize the FRTC at NAS Fallon through 1) renewal of the Navy's current public land withdrawal, 2) land range expansion through the additional withdrawal of public lands and the acquisition of non-federal land, 3) airspace expansion and modifications, and 4) upgrades to range infrastructure.

The information we have reviewed lacks a clear and consistent description of what is, and is not, subject

to Section 106 regarding the modernization of the FRTC. For example, the ACHP has been consistent in its position that the transfer of property from one federal agency to another federal agency is not an undertaking subject to Section 106, because a federal agency still has responsibilities under Sections 106 and 110 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) for the land it controls. (Note, however, how a federal agency plans to utilize the land once transferred may be subject to Section 106 review. As such, the Navy should not include the the withdrawal of federal land in its definition of the undertaking under Section 106.)

It is our understanding that the Navy is not proposing to change the level or type of training from what is stated in the 2015 Final EIS for Military Readiness Activities at FRTC, which provided for 10% increase in tempo annually to address the various missions. With the modernization, training activities will be redistributed across the expanded ranges for more efficient use of the training space.

 We seek further clarification as to whether the Navy is also producing a Legislative EIS or if it intends to issue a ROD to meet NEPA.

The ACHP assumes that the Navy intends to submit, in accordance with the FLPMA, a Land Withdrawal Case File renewal request to continue the withdrawal of the 202,864 acres, and a separate Land Withdrawal Case File for a request to withdraw an additional 618,727 acres of federal land. We are aware that the Pacific Fleet, with support from the Naval Facilities Engineering Command (NAVFAC) Southwest, has prepared and released a Draft Environmental Impact State (DEIS) in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). The 99th Civil Engineer Squadron (99CES), with support from the Air Force Civil Engineer Center's National Environmental Policy Act Center (AFCEC/NEPA Center) is working on a Legislative EIS to be included in the recommendation to Congress on the withdrawal proposal regarding the NTTR. (A Legislative EIS does not require a Record of Decision (ROD), as the decision on whether or not to approve the Land Withdrawal Case Files is made by Congress.)

• Please provide a concise explanation of what historic property identification efforts NAS Fallon has undertaken, or intends to take, for the 65,153 acres of private or state-owned (non-federal) land it is considering acquiring and the 618,727 acres of additional federal land.

It is understood that the Navy proposes the acquisition of 65,153 acres of private or state-owned (nonfederal) land in addition to the 618,727 acres of additional federal land under the FLPMA. The Navy has responsibilities under Sections 106 and 110 of the NHPA for the land it will control, and it is advisable for the federal agency to understand if historic properties exist on the property it intends to acquire.

 We seek clarification as to whether or not NAS Fallon is reviewing the FTRC Modernization in accordance with the 2011 Programmatic Agreement.

In 2011, the Programmatic Agreement Among Naval Air Station, Fallon, Nevada, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Officer and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation Regarding the Identification, Evaluation and Treatment of Historic Properties on Lands Managed by Naval Air Station, Fallon (2011 PA) was executed and is set to expire in August 2021. Documentation provided to the ACHP did not mention the 2011 PA. The 2011 PA is the Section 106 compliance document for NAS Fallon undertakings on Navy-acquired lands in Nevada, which includes the FRTC.

 We seek clarification as to how NAS Fallon will review the FTRC Modernization occurring on Bureau of Land Management (BLM) land.

In accordance with the 2011 PA, undertakings on lands withdrawn from the BLM are to be administered in accordance with the stipulations in the 2009 State Protocol Agreement between the BLM and the Nevada State Historic Preservation Officer. Documentation provided to the ACHP did not mention the 2009 BLM/SHPO State Protocol Agreement. Activities associated with the modernization of the FRTC are to be addressed in accordance with the 2009 BLM/SHPO State Protocol Agreement.

Thank you for your questions regarding the Navy's Section 106 consultation for the proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC). Following are responses intended to clarify and facilitate our continuing consultation.

1. We would appreciate an explanation of why Naval Air Station (NAS) Fallon's definition of the undertaking regarding the Fallon Training Range Complex (FRTC) Modernization did not include the Land Withdrawal Case Files under the Federal Land Policy Management Act (FLPMA).

The focus of the Navy's consultation on the proposed modernization of the FRTC is to amend the *Programmatic Agreement Among Naval Air Station, Fallon, Nevada, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Officer and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation Regarding the Identification, Evaluation and Treatment of Historic Properties on Lands Managed by Naval Air Station, Fallon* (2011 PA), in order to address potential effects to historic properties that may result from undertakings associated with the modernization. The proposed modernization also includes the acquisition, renewal, and expansion of withdrawn lands. We recognize that these actions, in and of themselves, are not subject to Section 106, however the Navy's activities on such newly acquired/renewed/expanded withdrawn lands may require review to evaluate potential effects to historic properties.

With respect to the case file under FLPMA, the Navy encloses for your reference the following materials: the applications submitted by the Navy for the relevant land withdrawals (renewals and new withdrawals); notices of receipt for these applications; and associated Federal Register notices. A copy of the Draft EIS for the Navy's proposed action can be found at the following link: www.frtemodernization.com. The Navy can provide additional materials upon request. Alternatively, a copy of the entire case file can be obtained from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) (case file # NVN 096256).

We seek further clarification as to whether the Navy is also producing a Legislative EIS or if it intends to issue a ROD to meet NEPA.

The Navy is preparing an EIS and intends to issue a ROD to meet obligations under NEPA. The FRTC Modernization EIS supports two separate decisions by two decision-making bodies. First, it serves as the detailed statement required by NEPA for Congress to consider in deciding whether to support authorization of the proposed FRTC Modernization to renew the existing public land withdrawal and to withdraw additional public lands. As such, it will enable Congress to make informed decisions regarding the Navy's proposed action. In this context, the EIS could be characterized as a Legislative EIS because any decision whether to renew the existing withdrawal or to withdraw the additional public lands will be made by the U.S. Congress and signed into law by the President. The EIS also serves as the environmental impact analysis informing a decision about sustainable and modernized airspace, maneuver areas, training facilities, and range infrastructure and resources. The Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Energy, Installations, and Environment will render a decision on a selected alternative to be implemented by the Navy (subject to Congressional authorization of and funding for the proposed action), including the acquisition of private land.

3. Please provide a concise explanation of what historic property identification efforts NAS Fallon has undertaken, or intends to take, for the 65,153 acres of private or state-owned (non-federal) land it is considering acquiring and the 618,727 acres of additional federal land.

The Navy is currently conducting surveys to identify historic properties, and the proposed PA amendment would include programmatic measures to continue identification efforts through its implementation on Navy undertakings associated with the modernization.

4. We seek clarification as to whether or not NAS Fallon is reviewing the FTRC Modernization in accordance with the 2011 Programmatic Agreement.

As noted, the Navy proposes to amend the 2011 PA in accordance with Stipulation X, in order to ensure its applicability to Navy undertakings related to the FRTC modernization and to extend the expiration date. Individual undertakings associated with the FRTC modernization would be reviewed in accordance with the amended PA.

5. We seek clarification as to how NAS Fallon will review the FTRC Modernization occurring on Bureau of Land Management (BLM) land.

At present, the 2011 PA stipulates that for lands withdrawn from BLM holdings, the Navy will follow the State Protocol Agreement between the BLM and the Nevada State Historic Preservation Officer (2009, 2014), whereas for all other lands Navy follows the procedures laid out in the PA. As part of the process to amend the agreement, the Navy will consult with the parties to the 2011 PA to evaluate the potential benefits of removing this stipulation in order to establish consistent procedures for all actions associated with the modernization.

Dear Dr. McCulloch,

The Navy is proposing to modernize the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC) located in northern Nevada in order to meet the aviation and ground training requirements assigned to the FRTC, as described in the FRTC Modernization Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). The proposed modernization includes undertakings with the potential to affect historic properties. Presently, the extent of the potential effects cannot be fully determined, thereby requiring a programmatic approach to govern the implementation of the FRTC program.

The Navy proposes to amend the 2011 Programmatic Agreement among Naval Air Station, Fallon, Nevada, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Officer and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation Regarding the Identification, Evaluation and Treatment of Historic Properties on Lands Managed by Naval Air Station, Fallon to accommodate proposed changes in the FRTC. The Navy's proposed amendments include: expanding the PA's applicability to NAS Fallon undertakings related to FRTC operations and modernization within the operational area of NAS Fallon; removing requirements to adhere to the policies and procedures of other Federal agencies; and extending the PA's sunset date by 5 years to allow time to develop a new agreement with your office and interested parties.

Consistent with previous communications, the Navy requests your assistance to amend the 2011 PA consistent with Stipulation X. This letter initiates consultation with the Signatories and Concurring Party on the proposed amendment. A draft Amendment is attached for consideration and comment. In accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969, the Department of the Navy (Navy) is initiating the preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to evaluate the potential environmental impacts associated with a comprehensive modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), Nevada. The federal proposal to be studied includes renewal of the existing withdrawal and reservation of public lands, withdrawal and reservation of additional public lands, and the modification and expansion of Special Use Airspace and other airspace areas in the FRTC. Implementation of this proposal supports military readiness requirements into the future.

The primary mission of the FRTC is to provide a tactical training environment to support the most realistic strike and integrated warfare training available for the United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet, U.S. Fleet Forces Command, U.S. Marine Corps, Naval Special Warfare Command, and other combat elements. As mission requirements have changes over the years and the performance of platforms and weapon system technologies has advanced, there is a need to modernize the airspace, ranges, maneuver areas, training facilities, and range infrastructure of the FRTC. Specifically, in addition to renewing the current withdrawal of 221,363 acres, the Navy is proposing to withdraw and reserve an additional 612,270 acres, for a total of 833,633 acres of public land. The public land currently withdrawn was made available for military use by the Department of Defense under Public Law 106-65, which will expire on November 5, 2021.

As the Federal agency authorized to manage public land in the State of Nevada as defined by the Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976 (43 U.S.C. Section 1701, as amended), , the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has jurisdiction by law for the Navy's proposed land renewal and withdrawal. As a result, the Navy requests BLM to serve as a cooperating agency for the development of its EIS pursuant to NEPA and associated regulations.

As the Lead Agency, the Navy will be responsible for overseeing preparation of the FRTC Modernization EIS, to include, but not be limited to the following environmental planning actions:

• Identifying and providing the necessary background information, including the most up-to-date real estate information, as well as scientific, encroachment, and resource management analysis, as best available data, to prepare the EIS and the associated withdrawal application;

- Scheduling and supervising meetings held in support of the NEPA process;
- Compiling, summarizing, and responding to comments received by the public, stakeholders, and interested parties; and
- Maintaining an administrative record and responding as appropriate to any Freedom of Information Act requests relating to this EIS.

The Navy requests that the BLM, in its role as a cooperating agency, provide support as follows:

- Providing timely comments on working drafts of the EIS and associated withdrawal application documents, in accordance with agreed upon and approved project schedules and commenting protocols;
- Responding to Navy requests for information, in particular those related to the public land withdrawal process and Federal management of public land in the State of Nevada,
- Participating as appropriate and as agreed upon in public involvement efforts and public meetings conducted by the Navy for the EIS;
- Adhering to the comprehensive project schedule as developed by the Navy in cooperation with BLM;
- Preparing BLM and withdrawal-application-specific documents;
- Maintaining an administrative record and responding as appropriate to any Freedom of Information Act requests relating to this EIS; and
- Providing a formal, written response to this request.

Churchill County is requesting Cooperating Agency status for the Fallon Range Training Complex Modernization EIS. County staff has extensive expertise in land use and environmental issues specific to our region, which will be addressed in the EIS. We maintain interest in collaboration with NAS Fallon and recognize the significant economic benefits NAS Fallon provides to our community, and therefore, have developed a strong, mutually beneficial partnership. This partnership, utilizing REPI and County funds, has resulted in the preservation of 5,000 acres of productive agricultural lands and the removal of development rights on properties surrounding the Base.

The County adopted a Master Plan pursuant to NRS 278.150 to establish our vision for the future. 

This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is seeking public input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military.  The proposed EIS has both high public interest as well as interest from several Native American Tribes

3. The proposed expansion and associated undertakings will involve multiple federal and state agencies and possibly private utilities

4. The Navy will use the NEPA process for Section 106 purposes 36CFR800.8 (2)(C).

5. A Programmatic Agreement (PA) will be developed with consulting parties as an appendices to the NEPA document and will document measures designed to avoid, minimize or mitigate any adverse effects to historic properties

6. The Navy hired an Ethnographer to identify known culturally significant that may be effected by proposed undertakings. 

The SHPO is unable to concur with the Department of the Navy's (Navy) determination that the area of potential effect (APE) for the proposed modernization of the training ranges at the Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) adequately accounts for all potential affects to historic properties pursuant to 36 CFR §800.4(a)(1) and 36 CFR §800.16(d). This is because no supporting documentation or justification was included in the subject documents; thus, the boundaries of the APE as present in the subject documents seem arbitrary.

Upon receipt of an APE submission for this undertaking that includes the appropriate written justification with the supporting documentation (e.g., comments received from Native American tribes, analysis of potential noise and vibration effects, etc.) the SHPO will resume its review.



The purpose of this letter is to inform you that NAS Fallon is seeking to develop a Programmatic Agreement in conjunction with its proposed range training modernization project. As you may be aware NAS Fallon is in the process of evaluating the environmental impacts associated with the proposed expansion of its existing ranges. To date three alternatives have been developed in coordination and consultation with local, state, federal and tribal governments. Actions under each of the proposed alternatives vary as do the potential effects to historic properties.

The Navy has begun the historic properties identification process associated with projects identified in Alternatives 2 and 3. Alternative 1 would in large part would close the ranges and curtail operations at the installation. The inventories associated with Alternatives 2 and 3 are focusing on locations that have been identified as target or maneuver areas.

The locations of target and training areas are predictable given terrain and safety constraints; whereas, as the potential re-route of State Highways 839 and 361, and the Paiute Pipeline will require substantial coordination and design and may not be ready for inventory until well after the deadline for the EIS has passed (Fiscal Year 2021).

In response to the situation NAS Fallon is proposing a phased identification and evaluation process as defined in 36 CFR 800.4(b)(2). The method by which the phased identification processes will be carried out will be defined by a Programmatic Agreement (36 CFR 800.14(b)) developed in consultation with your office, affected federal agencies, and tribal governments.

NAS Fallon will be sending letters out informing Federal Agencies and Tribal Governments involved in the development of the EIS informing them of this proposal

The proposed modernization includes undertakings with the potential to affect historic properties. Presently, the extent of the potential effects cannot be fully determined, thereby requiring a programmatic approach to govern the implementation of the FRTC program.

Thank you for your letter requesting cooperating agency status for the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC) Modernization Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) being prepared in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969.

Specifically, the Department of the Navy's action proponent, Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet, proposes to renew an existing withdrawal of public land, withdraw additional public lands, and modify and expand Special Use Airspace and other airspace areas in the FRTC. The proposal includes renewal of the existing withdrawal of public land for military use of 202,859 acres which is set to expire on November 5, 2021. An additional 604,789 acres of public land is also proposed for withdrawal as well as the acquisition of approximately 65,200 acres. Implementation of this proposal supports military readiness requirements into the future.

The primary mission of the FRTC is to provide a tactical training environment to support the most realistic strike and integrated warfare training for the U.S. Pacific Fleet, U.S. Fleet Forces Command, U.S. Marine Corps, Naval Special Warfare Command, and other combat elements. Each Tribe was sent a Notice of Intent to Prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) and to Announce Scoping Meetings for the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC) Modernization: Expansion of Land Ranges, Airspace Modifications, and Public Land Withdrawal Renewal; the scoping comment period extension notice; invitations to meetings with cooperating agencies to discuss the Proposed Action and alternatives; a request for assistance of regional Tribal Governments in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS; thank you letters for attending the meetings if applicable; an invitation to review the Draft EIS prior to the public release of the document; the Notice of Availability of the FRTC Modernization Draft EIS and meeting announcement; the comment period extension notice for the FRTC Modernization Draft EIS; a letter informing the Tribes that Naval Air Station Fallon proposes to develop a Programmatic Agreement in association with the proposed FRTC Modernization Undertaking; an invitation to review the Final EIS prior to the public release of the document; and in invitation to participate in a meeting to discuss the ongoing government-to-government consultation between the Navy and Nevada tribes. If requested, the Navy also consulted with Indian Tribes on sensitive properties; those consultation letters requesting meetings with the tribal government, cultural committee, elders, and any interested individual tribal members are contained in this Appendix. The Navy provided cultural inventory results in the proposed FRTC expansion to Tribes if requested. The Navy will continue to consult with Tribes and ensure an amended 2011 Programmatic Agreement is updated as applicable for the Tribes.

This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

- Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foresceable future actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Scoping Process

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

SUBJECT: FALLON RANGE TRAINING COMPLEX EXPANSION CULTURAL PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



In response to technological and tactical advancements, the Navy conducted a comprehensive analysis, referred to as the *Ninety Days to Combat* study, to determine the land and airspace needed to meet combat training requirements for modern aircraft and weapons systems. The analysis showed that the current size of the Fallon Ranges severely restricts the extent the Navy can use its weapons systems to train for combat. The proposed modernization would provide more realistic training capabilities while maintaining the safety of local communities.

The Navy's proposal to modernize the Fallon Ranges would include:

- Renewal of the current public land withdrawal
- Land range expansion through additional withdrawal of public lands and acquisition of non-federal land
- Airspace expansion and modifications

This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;

To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

August 25, 2016

- Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions on the human environment. No decisions about the Proposed Action or any real estate actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Scoping Process

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training-range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

- Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions on the human environment. No decisions about the Proposed Action or any real estate actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Scoping Process

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

The Navy is holding a series of meetings to discuss the project and to determine the type and scope of issues to be addressed in the EIS. Each of the seven scoping meetings will begin with a brief presentation about the project, followed by an open house with information stations staffed by Navy representatives.

Pursuant to 40 C.F.R. § 1506.2(b), the purpose of this letter is to request that the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribe be granted cooperating agency status in the project Fallon Range Training Complex Modernization, for the completion of the environmental assessment and environmental impact statement pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). Pursuant to the regulations implementing NEPA, to which all federal agencies must comply (40 C.F.R. § 1507.1) state and local governments may be granted cooperating agency status (see 40 C.F.R. §§ 1508.16 and 1508.12) or cooperating agency status when the state or local government has "special expertise with respect to any environmental impact involved in a proposal (or a reasonable alternative) for legislation or other major Federal action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment." 40 D.F.R. §1508.5. In this case, The Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribe has special expertise relating to the analysis of the federal agency's proposed decision on the physical environment, custom, culture and local tax base. For example land requested have direct cultural significance and are used by Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribal members for religious and healing purposes. The Stillwater mountain range and surround areas are used by our tribe and surrounding tribes for social gatherings and are used in maintaining our way of life as our ancestors have for centuries clear up to our present day. Restricting access of specific areas for healings lands, plants, roots and animals significantly affect the way of life for the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribe Reservation and Colony.

Additionally, according to the regulations, federal agencies shall cooperate to the fullest extent possible with State and local agencies. The regulations specifically state:

(b) Agencies shall cooperate with State and local agencies to the fullest extent possible to reduce duplication between NEPA and state and local requirements, unless the agencies are specifically barred from doing so by some other law... such cooperation shall to be the fullest extent possible include:

- Joint planning processes.
- Joint environmental research studies.
- (3) Joint public hearings (except where otherwise provided by statute).
- Joint environmental assessments.

(c) Agencies shall cooperate with State and local agencies to the fullest extent possible to reduce duplication between NEPA and comparable State and local requirements, unless the agencies are specifically barred from doing so by some other law. Except for cases covered by paragraph (a) of this sections, such cooperation shall to the fullest extent possible include join environmental impact statements. In such cases one or more Federal agencies and one or more State or local agencies shall joint lead agencies. Where State laws or local ordinances have environmental impact statement requirements in addition to but not in conflict with those in NEPA, Federal agencies shall cooperate in fulfilling these requirements as well as those of Federal laws so that one document will comply with all applicable laws.

(d) To better integrate environmental impact statements into State or local planning processes, statements shall discuss any inconsistency of a proposed action with any approved State or local plan and laws (whether or not federally sanctioned). Where an inconsistency exists, the statement should describe the extent to which the agency would reconcile its proposed action with the plan or law.

40 C.F.R. § 1506.2(b)(c)(d).

SUBJECT: FALLON RANGE TRAINING COMPLEX EXPANSION CULTURAL PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



SUBJECT: CULTURAL INVENTORY RESULTS PROPOSED FRTC EXPANSION

Enclosed for your information and comment is a report entitled A Class III Cultural Resource Inventory of 14,062 Acres for the Proposed Land Withdrawal for Naval Air (NAS) Fallon, Churchill, Mineral, and Nye Counties, Nevada.

The inventory was conducted on lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management, Carson City District- Stillwater Field Office (12,643.5 acres), Bureau of Reclamation-Mid-Pacific Region (1,231.8 acres), Department of Defense-NAS Fallon (45.7 acres), and private lands (141.0 acres). The inventories were conducted to identify cultural resources located within proposed target and maneuver areas associated with Alternative 1 of the proposed NAS Fallon Range Training Complex Modernization Environmental Impact Statement (EIS).

A total of 202 archaeological sites were newly recorded or updated as part of the current project (146 prehistoric, 38 historic, and 18 multicomponent).

The information contained within the report will be used to assess the impact of the actions associated with Alternative 1 (the "Proposed Action" as announced in August 2016). Please note that we are currently conducting further surveys to supplement this report with respect to Alternative 1, and that additional survey work may be required in the event that a different or modified alternative is ultimately identified in the EIS as the Navy's preferred alternative. Thus we may subsequently be providing additional information for your review; however, since this report provides the cultural resource information we have collected thus far, we would greatly appreciate your review of the report at this time. 

The document is now available for your review and comment, and the Navy will hold seven meetings throughout northern Nevada to inform you about the proposal and the results of the environmental impact analysis. The Fallon Range Training Complex is the Navy's premier aviation training range, supporting aviation and ground training, including live-fire training. However, newer-generation aircraft and weapons have outpaced the current capabilities of the Fallon Ranges.

In response to technological and tactical advancements, the Navy conducted a comprehensive analysis, referred to as the *Ninety Days to Combat* study, to determine the land and airspace needed to meet combat training requirements for modern aircraft and weapons systems. The analysis showed that the current size of the Fallon Ranges severely restricts the extent the Navy can use its weapons systems to train for combat. The proposed modernization would provide more realistic training capabilities while maintaining the safety of local communities.

The Navy's proposal to modernize the Fallon Ranges would include:

- Renewal of the current public land withdrawal
- Land range expansion through additional withdrawal of public lands and acquisition of non-federal land
- Airspace expansion and modifications

Dear Captain Morrison and Mr. Baskerville,

Thank you for your March 28, 2019 letter notifying the Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe that the Navy plans to prepare a programmatic agreement (PA) in coordination with the proposed expansion of the Naval Air Station Fallon. While the Tribe remains opposed to the proposed massive withdrawal of public lands and desecration of ancestral Tribal lands and cultural sites through military training, the Tribe will consider the draft PA you put forward.

To ensure a fruitful discussion on the PA, the Tribe encourages you to review the written comments we have previously submitted on this project, and to obtain and review written notes from inperson meetings with Tribal representatives (the Tribe is also awaiting production of these written notes, as repeatedly promised by NAS Fallon representatives, and would appreciate copies). In these written and oral comments, the Tribe explained that the lands in question are of paramount importance to the Tribe's history, culture, and religion, and that the Navy's proposed action would permanently and irreparably harm the Tribe and its past, present, and future members. Given the devastating significance of the proposed expansion to the Tribe, the Tribe requests to be an invited signatory to any proposed agreement intending to resolve adverse effects under the National Historic Preservation Act. *See* 36 CFR § 800.6(c)(2)(ii).

The Tribe has also repeatedly and clearly stated that meaningful consultation in compliance with the Navy's trust obligations to the Tribe, the National Historic Preservation Act, and the National Environmental Policy Act requires careful field survey of all the proposed expansion areas by members of the affected Tribes. As explained in 36 CFR § 800.2(c)(2)(ii), the agency must "consult with any Indian tribe or Native Hawaiian organization that attaches religious and cultural significance to historic properties that may be affected by an undertaking," and such consultation must be carried out in "a sensitive manner respectful of tribal sovereignty" and "the concerns and needs of the Indian tribe or Native Hawaiian organization." The size of the proposal does not in any way diminish the Navy's obligation to make all reasonable efforts necessary to identify and evaluate traditional cultural properties.

Following the survey(s), the Tribe proposes exclusion of significant cultural sites from the expansion and guaranteed, regular access to any remaining expansion areas such that Tribal members may carry out traditional cultural, spiritual, and medicinal practices.

Your letter identifies a phased approach to identification and evaluation of cultural properties. referencing 36 C.F.R. § 800.4(b)(2). The cited regulation does not allow the Navy to delay identification and evaluation of traditional cultural properties until after Congressional review of expansion. Under that regulation, any delay of evaluation of identified sites is only appropriate to the extent that the agency cannot know the specific activities proposed in the area of potential effect or the agency is presently excluded from the area of potential effect. Neither of these circumstances are present in this instance. The DEIS specifies which training activities would occur and where under each alternative, and identification and evaluation of traditional cultural properties must occur before the project moves forward. Moreover, even under a phased approach, as a first step the agency must "establish the presence of historic properties within the area of potential effects for each alternative...through background research, consultation and an appropriate level of field investigation." Id. (emphasis added). This evaluation must take into account the "views of the SHPO/THPO and any other consulting parties," which includes the Tribe and other affected Tribes. Thus, full identification, evaluation, and protection of traditional cultural properties must occur for all alternatives proposed, before selection of a final alternative and presentation of that alternative to Congress.

Finally, the PA should include the Bureau of Land Management and other federal agencies that presently manage the areas planned for expansion. BLM has extensive mapping of traditional cultural properties and experience consulting with the affected Tribes. Review of BLM's and other agency's materials is required as part of the research, identification, and evaluation of sites.

We look forward to further discussions on these important matters.

Captain Morrison, Ms. Kelley, Mr. Baskerville, and Mr. Bethke:

I write to you on behalf of the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribe (the Tribe). This letter responds to recent developments in the Navy's analysis of impacts of the proposed expansion of Naval Air Station Fallon, and supplements previous comments and materials submitted by the Tribe regarding the proposed expansion.

The Tribe requests that the Navy consider these comments in preparation of the Final Environmental Impact Statement and evaluation of alternatives, based on the ongoing duty to consult with the Tribe on a government-to-government basis. The Tribe also requests that these supplemental comments be considered as part of ongoing analysis under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, 54 U.S.C. §300101 *et seq.* (NHPA).

The Tribe has previously explained its deep concern that the proposed expansion would renew and greatly expand the impact of NAS Fallon. The withdrawal includes the heart of our aboriginal territory that includes many of our traditional hunting, gathering and sacred places that the Tribe as expressed to the Navy representatives continually at every meeting. In addition to the adverse impacts to our traditional lifeways, the renewal will harm Tribal members living on and near the Reservation, through the health impacts of frequent flyovers. Expansion will further harm Tribal members by eliminating access to more than 660,000 acres of our homelands and forever damaging sacred sites and traditional cultural properties.

The areas the Navy proposes for expansion and training with live munitions include but not limited to the Stillwater Range, Dixie Valley, Rawhide Hot Springs, Sand Mountain, Clan Alpines and areas surrounding Fox Peak and the Stillwater Marsh. The Tribe has lived in and continually used these areas for thousands of years, and the area affected includes "Our Mother" and "Our Father," where the Tribe was created. Since World War II the Navy has used our sacred sites as military targets which included our Mother and Father Stone at the base of Fox Peak as well as Medicine Rock in the middle of BRAVO 20. These sacred sites are the equivalent of the Vatican to Catholics, or Mecca to Muslims. The expanded withdrawal also includes many sacred and confidential burial sites, which are now at risk of bombing. The proposal to use munitions on and near the sites is akin to proposing military training at Arlington National Cemetery. The Navy's attempt to restrict access to the Tribe's homelands and destroy them through military training is a shameful perpetuation of the Navy's long legacy of damaging sacred Tribal resources.

Despite its opposition to expansion, the Tribe has provided concrete and workable mitigation proposals to the Navy, including suggested terms for an MOU which guarantees regular access to cultural sites for Tribal members, and funding and implementation of a cultural resources study prior to withdrawal. The Navy has <u>ignored</u> those suggestions.

As explained further below, the Tribe again requests formal government-to-government consultation with NAS Fallon leadership and development of a programmatic agreement in close cooperation with the Tribe as required by the National Historic Preservation Act and Navy policy. Resolution of adverse effects to traditional cultural properties requires a thorough cultural resources inventory, identification and protection of all sites, and guaranteed regular access for Tribal members. Finally, the Tribe requests that the Navy consider the best available evidence about noise impacts and risks of fire associated with Navy training, and to implement appropriate mitigation to reduce or eliminate those impacts.

Government to government consultation

The Navy is in violation of its consultation obligations including its own protocols. As a federal agency, the Navy has a solemn fiduciary obligation to Indian tribes, which includes the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone. To fulfill its trust duties to the Tribe, the Navy must *inter alia* follow the "American Indian and Alaska Native Policy and Department of Defense Instruction Number 4710.02: DoD Interactions with Federally-Recognized Tribes." In addition, the Navy must follow "SECNAV INSTRUCTION 11010.14B," which pertains to the Navy's trust obligations to federally-recognized Indian tribes, including the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone. Navy policy includes guidance for government-to-government consultation.

The DoD instruction requires government-to-government consultation including "meaningful communication addressing tribal concerns between tribes and military installations at both the tribal leadership-to-installation commander and the tribal staff-to-installation staff levels." Consultation requires that "DoD must provide affected tribes an opportunity to participate in the decision-making process that will ensure these tribal interests are given due consideration in a manner consistent with tribal sovereign authority," and timely, good faith communication throughout proposal development.

Navy guidance recognizes that consultation is a recurring requirement, and further specifies that

"[c]onsultations regarding proposed DON actions may include, but are not limited to grounddisturbing activities, construction, training, low level overflights, management of sites with religious or cultural significance, protection of sacred sites, access to sacred sites, access to subsistence and medicinal natural resources, disposition of cultural items ... and land use decisions." While "formal agreement is not necessary to satisfy consultation requirements," the Navy "is committed to developing and maintaining long-term working relationships of respect, trust, and cooperation with Indian tribes."

Unfortunately, the Navy has failed to uphold its trust duties to the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribe and is not following DoD or Navy instruction. The new Commander for Naval Air Station Fallon has yet to meet with Fallon Tribal leadership. After a year of diligently commenting and seeking to partner with the Navy in development of cultural resources inventories and an access memorandum of understanding, the Tribe recently learned through a public disclosure request that the Navy has abandoned development of a programmatic agreement with the affected tribes in favor of an agreement with the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office and the Advisory Council on Historic Places that excludes affected tribes. This discovery severely undermines any remaining confidence in the sincerity of the Navy's consultation efforts.

It is shameful that the Navy has failed to respond to the Tribe's repeated requests to facilitate a cultural resources inventory of the area proposed for renewal and withdrawal, has failed to present a draft memorandum of agreement for access to cultural sites, and appears to have failed to make use of existing cultural resources inventories held by the Bureau of Land Management and the SHPO. The Navy has asked the Tribe to identify all cultural sites on the more than 660,000 acres affected, with little notice on a desktop-sized map and with no resources made available to assist. In the meetings that have occurred, staff persons have not prepared agendas in advance, have not followed up on any requests, and have not provided meeting notes or minutes as requested. In short, consultation has not been "meaningful" but rather appears to be a cursory effort to fulfill what the Navy appears to view as a bureaucratic checklist.

Given the Navy's rapid timeline, and instead of further staff-level meetings which have proven to be fruitless, the Tribe requests consultation between the NAS Fallon Commanding Officer and Tribal leadership, explanation of how cultural resources will be adequately identified and protected, and prompt preparation and sharing of a draft programmatic agreement and memorandum of agreement for access to cultural sites.

Consultation under the NHPA

The Navy is currently in violation of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, which requires it to consult with the Tribe prior to any undertaking that "is a type of activity that has the potential to cause effects on historic properties." 36 CFR § 800.3(a). "Effect means alteration to the characteristics of a historic property qualifying it for inclusion in or eligibility for the National Register." 36 C.F.R. § 800.16(i). The criteria for inclusion on the National Register are listed at 36 C.F.R. § 60.4. "An adverse effect is found when an undertaking may alter, directly or indirectly, any of the characteristics of a historic property that qualify the property for inclusion in the National Register in a manner that would diminish the integrity of the property's location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, or association...Adverse effects may include reasonably foreseeable effects caused by the undertaking that may occur

later in time, be farther removed in distance or be cumulative." 36 C.F.R. § 800.5(a)(1).

The "integrity" of the site includes the ability of a resource to convey its significance through its setting and location. Access to the resource is key to the conveyance of significance. Indeed, the National Park Service, which administers the National Register of Historic Places, states a mission to "protect and provide access to our Nation's natural and cultural heritage and honor our trust responsibilities to tribes."¹

Up until very recently, the Navy has taken the correct position that the proposed withdrawal of public lands and associated transfer to the Navy, with associated loss of access and consequence of intensive military training on sacred sites, constitutes an undertaking that triggers Section 106 consultation. The Navy proposed development of a Programmatic Agreement with the Tribe and other parties to fulfill the Navy's Section 106 duties, and went so far as to promise in writing to provide a draft of such a document by June 2, 2019.

The Navy abruptly reversed course, abandoned the development of a programmatic agreement, and now apparently proposes to amend an existing Programmatic Agreement that does not involve any tribe as a concurring or signatory party. This new approach is unlawful and unacceptable to the Tribe. The withdrawal of public lands removes access for Tribal members to their traditional cultural properties. The lands would change from management by the Bureau of Land Management, with broad public access, to use for military training with associated destructive impacts and limited access. Because access is a key component of the integrity of historic properties, the loss of access is an impact that triggers Section 106 consultation. The Navy may achieve lawful consultation through development of a programmatic agreement with the Tribe or consultation on the undertaking; the Navy may not simply defer its obligations to some unknown later date after withdrawal has occurred.

The Navy should follow its initial plan and negotiate a programmatic agreement in good faith with the Tribe. The agreement should include careful inventory of cultural resources in the Area of Potential Effect, as required by the NHPA. Because the withdrawal involves impacts to sites of cultural, religious, and sacred significance, the Tribe should be consulted and invited to be a signatory to the agreement. 36 C.F.R. § 800.3(c)(2)(ii); 36 CFR § 800.6(c)(2)(ii).

The Tribe notes that even if the 2011 Programmatic Agreement applies, the Navy is not complying with its terms. The agreement requires the Navy to identify the APE, and then perform an inventory of the cultural resources within the APE. The Navy has not conducted such an inventory, nor has it made "reasonable and good faith efforts to timely obtain funds necessary" for an inventory as required by the PA. Where the Navy determines there are impacted cultural resources, it must consult with the SHPO and determine if all impacted resources are eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. If the Navy seeks to amend the 2011 PA, Section X requires that any amendment comply with 36 C.F.R. 800.14(b). 36 CFR 800.14(f) mandates that "[w]henever an agency official proposes a program alternative pursuant to paragraphs (a) through (e) of this section, the agency official shall ensure that development of the program alternative includes appropriate government-to-government consultation with affected Indian tribes and consultation with affected Native Hawaiian

organizations." The Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribe is an "affected Indian tribe" under this regulation, and must be consulted in the amendment or development of a programmatic agreement. Such consultation has not occurred.

In sum, as the Tribe has repeatedly conveyed to the Navy in meetings, letters, and comments, the area proposed for withdrawal and training is extremely rich in traditional cultural resources and preservation of those resources is of utmost importance to the Tribe. <u>Compliance with the NHPA requires the Navy to perform a careful and thorough cultural resources inventory of the entire area proposed for renewal and expansion, and to involve the Tribe in any programmatic agreement or memorandum of understanding. Resolution of adverse effects will require identification and protection of traditional cultural properties and guaranteed regular access for Tribal members.</u>

Supplemental NEPA comments

The Tribe requests that the Navy consider supplemental comments regarding likely impacts of the proposed renewal, withdrawal, and training.

Fire is a major concern for the Tribe given the generally hot and dry conditions in the region and the Navy's insistence on training with live munitions. As an example of the risk presented by the Navy's proposal, the Navy accidentally started the 1999 Sand Springs Fire, which spread to nearby BLM land and eventually burned all of Fairview Mountain. The mountain is a culturally significant area where Tribal members have gathered pine nuts from native pinyon pine trees for generations. The trees were burned in the fire and the Navy made no remediation efforts. The mountain is now covered in invasive plants and a significant cultural resource has been lost. With expanded training and no adequate fire prevention, fighting, or remediation plan in place, the Tribe has grave concern that fire will adversely impact both the training area and adjacent areas. The Tribe requests that the Navy create a detailed fire management plan that includes remediation, and secure funding for its implementation for the entirety of the withdrawal period.

These supplemental comments also incorporate a comment letter submitted by the Washington State Department of Health to the Navy regarding expansion of Growler training on Whidbey Island, Washington. The comments are notable in that they provide expert opinion on the impacts of noise to nearby residents, including both auditory and non-auditory impacts. The comments also recommend that the Navy carry out a health impact assessment which takes into account residents' actual experiences, rather than simply relying on generalized (and often outdated) research.

While the Growler expansion would take place in a different region and involves somewhat different technology, the deficiencies and concerns noted by the Washington State Department of Health are also issues with the NAS Fallon DEIS. The Tribe requests that the Navy consider the enclosed Washington State Department of Health comments and references as part of the Tribe's comments on this project, and apply the Washington State Department of Health recommendations to the National Environmental Policy Act and NHPA analysis of NAS Fallon expansion. A health impact assessment is particularly appropriate and necessary given the environmental justice impacts of imposing noise on the Tribal community.

This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

AUGUST 22, 2010

- Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions on the human environment. No decisions about the Proposed Action or any real estate actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Scoping Process

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

The Navy is holding a series of meetings to discuss the project and to determine the type and scope of issues to be addressed in the EIS. As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



Let me assure you that the Navy takes these important concerns seriously.

In continuation of our ongoing government-to-government consultation, I respectfully request your participation in face-to-face meetings on December 18, 2019 at 1:00-4:00 pm in the Tahoe Hearing Room, at the Richard H. Bryan Building, 901 S. Stewart Street, Carson City, NV 89701. My goals for the meeting will be to outline specific Navy proposals to address the following:

- · An overview of cultural resources survey efforts to date
- · A plan to partner with tribes to continue survey and identification efforts over time
- · An overview of how the proposed amended PA would be implemented
- · The proposed support for tribal access
- Protection of tribal burials
- · A commitment to continue meeting with tribal leadership throughout the process

The Navy is committed to working in partnership with the tribes for the long-term. As Commanding Officer, I remain committed to improving the installation's relationships with the tribes and maximize the protection of cultural resources. Since our last meeting, I have reached out to the highest levels of Navy leadership for increased support to address these concerns. At

This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

- Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and recource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions on the human environment. No decisions about the Proposed Action or any real estate actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Scoping Process

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



Let me assure you that the Navy takes these important concerns seriously.

In continuation of our ongoing government-to-government consultation, I respectfully request your participation in face-to-face meetings on December 18, 2019 at 1:00-4:00 pm in the Tahoe Hearing Room, at the Richard H. Bryan Building, 901 S. Stewart Street, Carson City, NV 89701. My goals for the meeting will be to outline specific Navy proposals to address the following:

- An overview of cultural resources survey efforts to date
- · A plan to partner with tribes to continue survey and identification efforts over time
- · An overview of how the proposed amended PA would be implemented
- · The proposed support for tribal access
- · Protection of tribal burials
- · A commitment to continue meeting with tribal leadership throughout the process

The Navy is committed to working in partnership with the tribes for the long-term. As Commanding Officer, I remain committed to improving the installation's relationships with the tribes and maximize the protection of cultural resources. This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

August 25, 2016

- Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. SUBJECT: FALLON RANGE TRAINING COMPLEX EXPANSION CULTURAL PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



Enclosed for your information and comment is a report entitled A Class III Cultural Resource Inventory of 14,062 Acres for the Proposed Land Withdrawal for Naval Air (NAS) Fallon, Churchill, Mineral, and Nye Counties, Nevada.

The inventory was conducted on lands managed by the Burcau of Land Management, Carson City District- Stillwater Field Office (12,643.5 acres), Bureau of Reclamation-Mid-Pacific Region (1,231.8 acres), Department of Defense-NAS Fallon (45.7 acres), and private lands (141.0 acres). The inventories were conducted to identify cultural resources located within proposed target and maneuver areas associated with Alternative 1 of the proposed NAS Fallon Range Training Complex Modernization Environmental Impact Statement (EIS).

A total of 202 archaeological sites were newly recorded or updated as part of the current project (146 prehistoric, 38 historic, and 18 multicomponent).

The information contained within the report will be used to assess the impact of the actions associated with Alternative 1 (the "Proposed Action" as announced in August 2016). Please note that we are currently conducting further surveys to supplement this report with respect to Alternative 1, and that additional survey work may be required in the event that a different or modified alternative is ultimately identified in the EIS as the Navy's preferred alternative. Thus we may subsequently be providing additional information for your review; however, since this report provides the cultural resource information we have collected thus far, we would greatly appreciate your review of the report at this time. Accordingly, we ask that you please complete your review and provide any comments by January 6, 2018.

The analysis showed that the current size of the Fallon Ranges severely restricts the extent the Navy can use its weapons systems to train for combat. - A plan to partner with tribes to continue survey and identification efforts over time
- · An overview of how the proposed amended PA would be implemented
- The proposed support for tribal access
- Protection of tribal burials
- · A commitment to continue meeting with tribal leadership throughout the process

The Navy is committed to working in partnership with the tribes for the long-term. As Commanding Officer, I remain committed to improving the installation's relationships with the tribes and maximize the protection of cultural resources. Since our last meeting, I have reached out to the highest levels of Navy leadership for increased support to address these concerns. At

This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

August 25, 2016

- Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foresceable future actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Scoping Process

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



Enclosed for your information and comment is a report entitled A Class III Cultural Resource Inventory of 14,062 Acres for the Proposed Land Withdrawal for Naval Air (NAS) Fallon, Churchill, Mineral, and Nye Counties, Nevada.

The inventory was conducted on lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management, Carson City District-Stillwater Field Office (12,643.5 acres), Bureau of Reclamation-Mid-Pacific Region (1,231.8 acres), Department of Defense-NAS Fallon (45.7 acres), and private lands (141.0 acres). The inventories were conducted to identify cultural resources located within proposed target and maneuver areas associated with Alternative 1 of the proposed NAS Fallon Range Training Complex Modernization Environmental Impact Statement (EIS).

A total of 202 archaeological sites were newly recorded or updated as part of the current project (146 prehistoric, 38 historic, and 18 multicomponent).

The information contained within the report will be used to assess the impact of the actions associated with Alternative 1 (the "Proposed Action" as announced in August 2016). Please note that we are currently conducting further surveys to supplement this report with respect to Alternative 1, and that additional survey work may be required in the event that a different or modified alternative is ultimately identified in the EIS as the Navy's preferred alternative. Thus we may subsequently be providing additional information for your review; however, since this report provides the cultural resource information we have collected thus far, we would greatly appreciate your review of the report at this time. 

The U.S. Navy has prepared a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of the proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex, located in northern Nevada. The document is now available for your review and comment, and the Navy will hold seven meetings throughout northern Nevada to inform you about the proposal and the results of the environmental impact analysis. The Navy welcomes your review and comments on the Draft EIS. In addition, the Navy welcomes the opportunity to schedule a presentation with your office on this project. The Fallon Range Training Complex is the Navy's premier aviation training range, supporting aviation and ground training, including live-fire training. The Navy trains 100 percent of deploying naval aviation and naval special warfare units at the Fallon Ranges. The current bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s. However, newer-generation aircraft and weapons have outpaced the current capabilities of the Fallon Ranges.

In response to technological and tactical advancements, the Navy conducted a comprehensive analysis, referred to as the *Ninety Days to Combat* study, to determine the land and airspace needed to meet combat training requirements for modern aircraft and weapons systems. The analysis showed that the current size of the Fallon Ranges severely restricts the extent the Navy can use its weapons systems to train for combat. The proposed modernization would provide more realistic training capabilities while maintaining the safety of local communities.

The Navy's proposal to modernize the Fallon Ranges would include:

- · Renewal of the current public land withdrawal

This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

August 25, 2016

Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;

- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement, and
- Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions on the human environment. No decisions about the Proposed Action or any real estate actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Scoping Process

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



As Commanding Officer, I remain committed to improving the installation's relationships with the tribes and maximize the protection of cultural resources. Since our last meeting, I have reached out to the highest levels of Navy leadership for increased support to address these concerns. At

This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

- Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions on the human environment. No decisions about the Proposed Action or any real estate actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Scoping Process

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

The Navy is holding a series of meetings to discuss the project and to determine the type and scope of issues to be addressed in the EIS. Each of the seven scoping meetings will begin with a brief presentation about the project, followed by an open house with information stations staffed by Navy representatives.

SUBJECT: FALLON RANGE TRAINING COMPLEX EXPANSION CULTURAL PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential cligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



However, newer-generation aircraft and weapons have outpaced the current capabilities of the Fallon Ranges.

In response to technological and tactical advancements, the Navy conducted a comprehensive analysis, referred to as the *Ninety Days to Combat* study, to determine the land and airspace needed to meet combat training requirements for modern aircraft and weapons systems. The analysis showed that the current size of the Fallon Ranges severely restricts the extent the Navy can use its weapons systems to train for combat. The proposed modernization would provide more realistic training capabilities while maintaining the safety of local communities.

This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

- · Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- · Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions on the human environment. No decisions about the Proposed Action or any real estate actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

SUBJECT: FALLON RANGE TRAINING COMPLEX EXPANSION CULTURAL PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

- Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;

SUBJECT: FALLON RANGE TRAINING COMPLEX EXPANSION CULTURAL PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

- Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Scoping Process

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

The Navy is holding a series of meetings to discuss the project and to determine the type and scope of issues to be addressed in the EIS. Each of the seven scoping meetings will begin with a brief presentation about the project, followed by an open house with information stations staffed by Navy representatives.

Dear Chairman Sanchez:

At approximately 9:32 on March 30, 2016 a F/A-18 dropped two 25 lb MK 76 practice bombs while performing a training mission in the vicinity of B19. The MK 76s impacted the ground at approximately 39° 04' 06.11" N 118° 40' 33.92" W. These coordinates are south of B-19 and on the Walker River Tribe Reservation Land. The Navy Explosive Ordnance Detachment (EOD) was contacted and was requested to search the suspected impact area.

On March 31, EOD conducted a one square kilometer sweep centered at 39° 04' 06.11" N 118° 40' 33.92" W. The search consisted of concentric circles getting progressively larger until the largest circle was 600m in radius. EOD found neither the MK 76s nor any evidence of impact. Due to the small size of the MK 76s and the speed at which it was released, it is probable that the became buried upon impact. Following the search, EOD advised a Walker River Paiute Tribe member of the outcome of its search and requested the Tribe member contact EOD in the event that they come across any off-range ordnance in the future.

A MK 76 practice bomb is roughly 2 feet in length and 4 inches in diameter. The only hazardous component within the MK 76 is the spotting charge of approximately 0.007 lbs of Net Explosive Weight which is equivalent to a round of small arms ammunition.

Upon impact, the air crew spotted the charges detonating, so we believe no hazards associated with the MK 76s exist. The determination that the MK 76s are likely buried under the surface is based on the speed and trajectory of the MK 76s upon release. This is further supported by the fact that EOD was unable to locate them on the surface.

There is no likely appreciable human or environmental health risk associated with the MK 76s due to the likelihood of the MK 76s having buried themselves and the detonation of the spotting charges upon impact. We believe further attempts at recovery would be more detrimental to the environment due to the amount of equipment, excavation and ground disturbance such efforts would likely involve.





The Walker River Paiute Tribe feels that our participation as a Cooperating Agency would be important to the development of the EIS with the Tribe's historical knowledge and expertise with respect to the environmental impacts applicable to the land, air quality, water resources, plants, cultural resources and traditional resources located within the FRTC Modernization EIS study area. The Tribe has a responsibility to protect its natural and cultural resources.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN COMMANDER, NAVY REGION SOUTHWEST AND WALKER RIVER PAIUTE TRIBE

NOTIFICATION AND ASSISTANCE PROTOCOL FOR ADDRESSING OFF-RANGE ORDNANCE, HAZARDOUS MATERIAL INCIDENTS AND AIRCRAFT MISHAPS THAT HAVE IMPACT ON WALKER RIVER PAIUTE TRIBAL LANDS

I. PARTIES TO THE AGREEMENT

(a) This Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) is made and entered into by the Walker River Paiute Tribe (Tribe), and Commander, Navy Region Southwest (CNRSW), by and through the Commanding Officer Naval Air Station, Fallon, Nevada (NAS Fallon).

II. REFERENCES

(a) DoD 4710.02 (b) SECNAVINST 11010.14A

III. PURPOSE

(a) The purpose of this MOA is to establish a reporting and assistance process for NAS Fallon to follow in the event that:

- (1). Off-range ordnance, flares, other military munitions or debris lands on Tribal land;
- (2). A hazardous material incident occurs that poses a health or safety risk to the Tribe;
- (3). An aircraft mishap occurs on or adjacent to Tribal lands;

(4). A military training activity poses a potential danger to the health, safety, or economic wellbeing of the Tribe.

(b) This agreement shall delineate certain reporting requirements and establish emergency entry and assistance procedures that will allow NAS Fallon personnel to enter onto Tribal sovereign lands in certain circumstances to assess and address impacts or hazards resulting from military training. It will also serve to establish a more formal and regular schedule of meetings and exchanges of information between NAS Fallon and the Tribe.

IV. AUTHORITY FOR ENTERING INTO THIS AGREEMENT

(a) Whereas, the Walker River Paiute Tribe is a federally recognized Indian Tribe, with sovereign lands located under NAS Fallon's Special Use Airspace;

(b) Whereas, the governing body of the Tribe is organized under the provisions of the *Indian Reorganization Act* of June 18, 1934, as amended, to exercise certain rights of home rule;

(c) Whereas, the Tribe has the responsibility to serve the Tribal Members and residents of the Walker River Paiute Reservation, protect its natural and cultural resources, ensure the safety of its members, and promote the economic and social welfare of its members;

(d) Whereas, the Tribe has the responsibility to protect and manage its sovereign lands in a manner that ensures the land's suitability for current uses and its benefit for future generations;

(e) Whereas, NAS Fallon is a shore activity of the Department of the Navy, which includes airto-ground training ranges and public lands that have been withdrawn for those training ranges, and those withdrawn public lands are used to provide critical training in support of the Department of Defense's national security mission;

(f) Whereas, NAS Fallon's mission is to provide integrated air strike and air warfare training in a realistic threat environment for military aircrews - primarily to improve power projection/interdiction capabilities of the U.S. Navy Carrier Air Wings - and the readiness of the U.S. Navy fleet is vital to national defense and security;

(g) Whereas, over time, military ordnance, both live and inert, flares and other debris has fallen or been carried by winds outside the boundaries of NAS Fallon's B-19 training range and onto significant amounts of Tribal lands with impacts that were identified by a Navy funded survey as "contaminated";

(h) Whereas, the Tribe and NAS Fallon desire to enter into this government-to-government relationship through an MOA to address the process by which NAS Fallon shall notify and consult the Tribe about:

Ordnance or flares that have fallen or been carried by winds onto Tribal lands;
 Hazardous material accidents which may be reasonably anticipated to affect Tribal lands or the Tribe;

(3). Aircraft mishaps;

(4). Any other activity conducted by NAS Fallon *(e.g.,* scheduled training exercises) that may be reasonably anticipated to have an impact on Tribal lands or the health, safety or livelihood of Tribal members or residents of the Reservation.

(i) Whereas, the Tribe and NAS Fallon further desire that this MOA establish a process whereby NAS Fallon may enter upon Tribal lands to retrieve munitions and/or remediate any resulting damage to Tribal lands that may have been caused by military training. Finally, the Tribe and NAS Fallon further desire to establish a formal and regular schedule of meetings with one another to develop enhanced awareness of each other's missions, activities, and culture, and as a means to share information regarding common areas of concern, safety issues and potential business opportunities.

V. TERMS OF THE AGREEMENT

Now, therefore, the Tribe and NAS Fallon agree as follows:

(a) Appropriate points of contact shall be named for the purpose of reporting mishaps that damage or impact Tribal land, or the health, safety or livelihood of the Members of the Tribe.

(1). NAS Fallon agrees to provide a single point of contact ("POC") that will be responsible for notifying the Tribe and coordinating all remedial actions related to military mishaps that impact the Tribe. The POC shall be the Operations Duty Officer for Naval Air Station Fallon, telephone (775) 426-2419. In the event the primary POC is not available, the alternate POC is Commanding Officer (CO), NAS Fallon, telephone (775) 426-2700;

(2). The Tribe agrees that for incident reporting and coordination purposes, the single POC from the Tribe shall be the Walker River Paiute Tribal Chairperson, telephone (775) 773-2306. In the event that the primary POC is unavailable, the alternate POC is the Tribe's Police Department, telephone (775) 773-2544. Phone numbers may be updated without changing this agreement.

(b) Reporting incidents, discovery of off-range ordnance, and entry onto Tribal lands for the purpose of inspection, removal, or rendering safe (blown in place) of off-range ordnance, flares or other debris that has fallen or been carried by winds onto Tribal lands, shall be as follows:

(1). Notification procedure: One party shall notify the other as soon as possible, but not later than 24 hours after occurrence or discovery of an incident in which ordnance, flares or any other type of material or debris used in military training exercises or otherwise under the control of the United States military have landed or been carried by winds onto Tribal lands, and will provide information on the location, ordnance or debris involved, extent of any damage or destruction to the land or its fixtures, and the recommended plan of action to retrieve or render safe such ordnance. Within one week following the initial notification, the identifying party will forward written notification of the incident, to include the above information, to the other party.

(2). Entry procedure: In consultation with the Tribe's POC or alternate POC, NAS Fallon will arrange an appropriate time and place to meet with the Tribe's Designee. Navy Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) unit will ensure the area is safe and determine the best access and egress routes for both parties. Following the determination of hazards, a safety brief will be given to all parties present. If and to the extent circumstances allow, the Tribe's POC will accompany EOD to the site for the purpose of inspection and damage assessment, as well as possible ordnance removal or action rendering such ordnance safe. Unless the Tribe's POC specifically agrees in writing, except where otherwise provide in (3) in this Section, NAS Fallon personnel shall not enter onto Tribal land for the purpose of viewing, retrieving, or rendering safe ordnance without notifying the Tribe prior to entering.

(3). Where NAS Fallon has knowledge that ordnance poses an *imminent* threat to the Tribe and/or property on Tribal land, the Tribe hereby gives NAS Fallon personnel authorization to come onto Tribal land to remove or render such ordnance safe. NAS

Fallon agrees to provide Tribe's POC notice and emergency response information as soon as reasonably practical, and shall follow all other requirements stated in this MOA.

(4). Clean-up and removal of ordnance, flares or other debris shall include the removal of all pieces of such ordnance, flares or debris from the site. The impact area will be backfilled to the original grade. All debris must be removed from the site by the Navy and may not be buried on the Reservation. NAS Fallon, in coordination with the Tribe, will develop a plan to restore the impacted area within one month from completion of the cleanup, seasons and weather permitting. Site restoration (reseeding) will take place during the time of year in which germination is likely to occur (i.e., spring or fall). Within three weeks from the notice of the mishap, NAS Fallon shall provide a written revegetation plan to the Tribe, which must be agreed upon by the parties. NAS Fallon will be responsible for funding and executing any necessary re-vegetation plan.

- (5). Investigation and clean up of ordnance, flares or debris upon Tribe lands shall be handled as described above and include the following (if necessary):
 - Location of command post/staging area will be coordinated with the Tribe.
 - (2) No road construction, earthwork or vegetative (including trees) removal is authorized to gain access to the site. Vehicle use is restricted to well established roads and trails and no off road vehicle travel is allowed without written approval from the Tribe's POC.
 - (3) All debris will be removed from the Tribe's lands and affected area(s) will be restored to their natural state.

(c) Reporting and material removal associated with Navy aircraft mishaps on Tribal lands shall be as follows:

(1). In the event of an aircraft mishap on or adjacent to Tribal lands, NAS Fallon will immediately locate and dispatch search and rescue helicopter(s), if available, to the mishap site.

(2). NAS Fallon will notify the Tribe immediately of the mishap and provide the location, size of affected area, and any information on soil contamination (fuel), ordnance and size of burn area. Appropriate Navy or other uniformed service personnel will provide 24-hour security at the mishap site until the wreckage is removed. A command post/staging area will be established adjacent to the site.

(3). In order to ensure the safety of all Tribal members and ensure an unimpeded federal emergency response and investigation of military aviation aircraft mishaps sites, NAS Fallon personnel shall have certain exclusive emergency response authorities to manage aircraft mishap crash sites; This may include but are not limited to:

(1) Establishing perimeters and restricted access points

- (2) Controlling access to the site, including restricting Tribal access
- (3) Fire fighting
- (4) Field investigation
- (5) Clean up and removal of debris and other materials

(4). Upon establishment of such perimeters or access points, NAS Fallon shall coordinate with the appropriate Tribal POC to provide escorted site access and visits. Tribal law enforcement entities shall provide assistance to NAS Fallon personnel in establishing a perimeter or restricting access as may be necessary to ensure the safety and security of Tribal lands or Tribe members.

(5). Fires associated with the mishap will be extinguished by the Navy at the impact area (500 feet around the mishap site) with hand tools, water and chemical extinguishers, if possible.

(6). Navy field investigation of any mishap will be on foot. If there is a requirement to retrieve large objects, helicopter transport may be used. If that is not possible, due either to safety concerns or the inability to secure the object for air transport, motor vehicles will be used to relocate the objects to the staging area. Vehicle access to the mishap site and command post/staging area shall be restricted to the overland travel route for both ingress and egress. This route will not be graded and/or bladed unless necessary.

(7). Clean-up and removal of mishap debris shall include the removal of all pieces of debris from the site. The impact area will be backfilled to the original grade. All debris must be removed from the site by the Navy and may not be buried on the Reservation. NAS Fallon, in coordination with the Tribe, will develop a plan to restore the impacted area within one month from completion of the cleanup, seasons and weather permitting. Site restoration (reseeding) will take place during the time of year in which germination is likely to occur (i.e., spring or fall). Within three weeks from the notice of the mishap, NAS Fallon shall provide a written re-vegetation plan to the Tribe, which must be agreed upon by the parties. NAS Fallon will be responsible for funding and executing any necessary re-vegetation plan.

(8). Navy investigation and cleanup of aircraft mishaps upon Tribal lands shall be handled as described above and include the following:

(1) Location of command post/staging area will be coordinated with the Tribe.

(2) No road construction, earthwork or vegetative (to include trees) removal is authorized to gain access to the mishap site. Vehicle use is restricted to well established roads and trails and no off road vehicle travel is allowed without written approval from the Tribe's POC.

(3) All visible and hazardous mishap debris will be removed from the Tribe's lands and affected area(s) will be restored to their natural state.

(d) Reporting and coordinating corrective action associated with hazardous material incidents on Tribal lands shall be as follows:

(1) NAS Fallon will notify the Tribe immediately of any hazardous material incident that NAS Fallon has reason to believe has impacted Tribal lands, and provide information on the location, material(s) spilled and quantity, size of contaminated area, and the corrective action that NAS Fallon proposes to take to contain the spill. Within one week of the incident, NAS Fallon will forward written notification of the incident, to include the above information, to the Tribe.

(2) NAS Fallon, in consultation with the Tribe and with the Tribe's concurrence, will implement long-range corrective action, as required, in connection with any hazardous materials incident.

(3) If corrective action requires personnel from NAS Fallon to enter onto Tribal lands, the NAS Fallon POC shall obtain permission from the Tribe's POC before doing so. Moreover, unless the Tribe's POC specifically waives this requirement in writing on a case-by-case basis, whenever NAS Fallon personnel are on Tribal land, they shall be accompanied by a designee of the Tribe.

(4) Within one week after the completion of any necessary corrective action, NAS Fallon shall forward a letter report of corrective action taken to the Tribal Chairperson. The letter shall include all pertinent data, including the corrective action taken, correspondence with the Tribe, and photos (before and after) associated with the spill or incident site.

(5) NAS Fallon shall conduct all clean up activities in compliance with all federal laws regarding hazardous materials.

(e) NAS Fallon will notify the Tribe, in advance, of any upcoming training exercise that is expected to negatively impact or disrupt the Tribe's daily activities or that poses a safety risk to any member of the Tribe. Examples of the kind of training exercise that should be the subject of prior notification include: sustained low-level flights over or adjacent to Tribal lands or scheduled demolitions that are expected to produce sufficient force and sound to shake buildings and windows on the Reservation. Such notification should be made enough in advance of the training exercise to reasonably allow the Tribe to give advance warning to its members.

(f) The Navy has over many years contaminated Tribal lands with ordnance and other debris that has not been removed from the Reservation. The Navy identified as potentially contaminated approximately 6173 acres of Reservation land. The Tribe has not been compensated for the Navy's contamination, for the Navy's continuing trespass on the Reservation and for the Tribe losing the use of the land. The parties agree that they will enter into discussions that seek to resolve this long-standing issue within sixty (60) days of execution of this MOA.

(g) The parties acknowledge that this Agreement, and no other agreements or documents from the Tribe, give NAS Fallon or any other U.S. military personnel any right to trespass on, contaminate, destroy or harm in any way Tribal lands or resources. While NAS Fallon has a long history of such conduct, the Tribe in no way condones such behavior or activity and demands that NAS Fallon compensate the Tribe for such activities. Based on the foregoing, the parties agree that as soon as possible after any action by NAS Fallon that constitutes a trespass, contamination, destruction or harm to the Tribe or its resources, the parties will meet to determine fair and reasonable monetary or other compensation that NAS Fallon will provide to the Tribe for the activities. The fair and reasonable monetary or other compensation will be determined based on the damage caused, threat to Tribal members and others on the Reservation, trespass fees and all other factors. While military personnel often refer to the Reservation as simply a barren desert, the parties acknowledge that the Reservation is the Tribe' homeland and is sacred, so that any unauthorized actions by military personnel constitute significant harm and damage to the Tribe. At a minimum, NAS shall pay the Tribe the following amounts for the following types of contamination incidents: \$50,000 for hazardous or other debris; \$250,000 for hazardous or other debris that cannot be located or cannot be removed; \$1,000,000 for jet, helicopter, drone or aerial vehicle crash; and \$10,000 per week (\$10,000 minimum) for failing to report an incident within the time frames stated herein.

(h) NAS Fallon's failure to comply with the terms of this MOA shall constitute harm to the Tribe that NAS Fallon agrees must be addressed through paying monetary or other compensation. Similar to the process stated in Subsection (g) above, the parties agree that as soon as possible after any action by NAS Fallon that constitutes a failure to comply with the terms of this MOA, the parties will meet to determine fair and reasonable monetary or other compensation that NAS Fallon will provide to the Tribe for the action.

VI. ADMINISTRATION OF THE AGREEMENT

(a) In order to foster better and more frequent communication between the parties, and in the spirit of intergovernmental cooperation, the parties agree to meet, face to-face, at least twice a year. One of these formal meetings will be hosted by the Tribal Chairperson at the Reservation and the other hosted by the CO NAS Fallon at the Installation. At the beginning of each calendar year, the Tribal Chairperson will arrange an acceptable date for the parties to meet at the Reservation and the CO, NAS Fallon will arrange an acceptable date for the parties to meet at the base. Meeting agendas will be approved by both parties prior to the meeting, and draft meeting minutes will be published by the Navy and allow comments from the Tribe for 30 days following the meeting before publishing final meeting minutes.

(b) To demonstrate its commitment to the health, safety and well-being of the Tribe, NAS Fallon agrees to distribute educational materials and conduct safety demonstrations, upon request once per year, for the Tribe, regarding the identification and procedures to take when Tribal members come in contact with military or non-military ordnance.

(c) This MOA shall not be construed as a waiver or release of liability for any claims the Walker River Paiute Tribe has against the United States, Department of the Navy or any other United States military service on the basis of contamination, trespass, or any other causes of action, that existed prior to this MOA or that arises during the term of this MOA.

(d) This MOA shall remain in force and effect for a three year term beginning when the last party signs this MOA, or until a party withdraws or it is superseded by another document.

(e) The MOA may be amended by mutual written agreement of the parties.

(f) Any party may withdraw from the MOA upon 60 days written notice to the other party.

This MOA is effective upon the last signature date.

RE: Comments on the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC) Modernization Environmental Impact Statement (EIS)

Dear Sir,

The Walker River Paiute Tribe of Schurz, Nevada wishes to submit the following comments regarding the FRTC Modernization EIS.

The Tribe initially received a letter from David Halloran, Captain, U.S. Navy Commanding Officer of the Fallon Naval Air Station dated August 25, 2016. The letter was a "NOTICE OF INTENT TO PREPARE AN ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENT AND TO ANNOUNCE SCOPING MEETINGS FOR THE FALLON RANGE TRAINING COMPLEX MODERNIZATION: EXPANSION OF LAND RANGES, AIRSPACE MODIFICATION, AND PUBLIC LAND WITHDRAWAL RENEWAL". This letter noted its proposals of renewing an existing public land withdrawal, withdrawing an additional 604,789 acres of additional public lands and to expand existing land ranges, etc. The letter further noted the Environmental Analysis that would be done as well as the scoping meetings dates and places to be held. Comments were welcomed by the November 25, 2016 deadline. The most important paragraph in this letter was the following statement: "The purpose of this letter is to formally initiate Government-to-Government consultation in accordance with legislation, Executive Orders, regulations and policy, including sections 101 and 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended, and 36 Code of Federal Regulations 800." Naval staff was to be contacting our staff "in the coming days" to discuss the possibility of scheduling a meeting.

In reviewing the draft EIS, under Government-to-Government Consultation it states:

The Navy has solicited comments from Native American tribes potentially affected by the project by letter, phone, and e-mail and has received both written and oral responses. As is required by 36 CF.R. 800 and as is appropriate, the Navy will continue to actively engage the tribes in Government-to-Government consultations until the end of the project.

Printed in the Appendices of the Draft EIS there are some letters that have been sent to the Tribe. A letter dated May 16, 2013 notifies the Tribe of the EIS for Military Readiness Activities at U.S. Navy Fallon Range Training Complex. The next letter dated January 20, 2015 has a subject of Notice of Availability of the Draft EIS for Military Readiness Activities at U.S. Navy Fallon Range Training Complex. The first line of the letter states: "This letter initiates consultation with the Walker River Paiute Tribe of the Walker River Reservation in regard to the subject " It further goes on to note when a public meeting will be held (Fallon - February 19, 2015). Government-to-Government Consultation issues and discussion will be with the Tribal Council and not at a public meeting in order to meet the consultation requirements. The next letter dated April 23, 2015 has the subject line Draft EIS on Military Readiness Activities at U.S. Navy Fallon Range Training Center. The first line in this letter states "This letter continues consultation with the Walker River Paiute Tribe in regard to the subject undertaking in accordance with 36 CFR 800, regulations implementing Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended." It further states that the Navy initiated Section 106 consultation with the Tribe in its letter dated January 20, 2015. In addition, it states information from the Nevada State Historic Preservation Officer. Again, this letter does not constitute "consultation" with the Tribe. The final letter, dated June 11, 2015, "thanks" the Tribe for having two individuals for participate and attend a meeting regarding the FRTC EIS.

The Tribe is interested in entering into formal Government-to-Government Consultation on this EIS. Such will require an initial meeting with the Tribal Council that will be held here on the Walker River Paiute Reservation.

On October 14, 2016 Tribes were invited to a meeting that was held at the Youth Activity Center at the NAS in Fallon. There were representatives from five (5) tribes in attendance; attending from our Tribe was Victoria Guzman, Cynthia Oceguera, Marlene Begay and Elveda Martinez. A PowerPoint presentation titled "Required Training Capabilities of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC) – The Carrier in the Desert" was shown. Information included: the FRTC training information, mission training, design for combat success, combat training realism, training infrastructure, weapons analysis, Naval Special Warfare Analysis, land summaries, information on the different Bravo's, airspace summary, environmental resource areas to be analyzed and the NEPA process and timeline. Most of the information wasn't understandable to the average person and tribal staff expressed their lack of understanding on this presentation. The FRTC Modernization pamphlet was also provided to those in attendance; this information is also included on the EIS website.

Tribal representatives were given the opportunity to express their concerns, provide information and ask questions, such as:

*This presentation/meeting should not be considered "official" Government-to-Government consultation. That needs to be with each individual Tribe and be between decision making individuals.

*Is the Navy asking for the increased land withdrawals with the intention of getting what they can or do they really need all of this land?

*Will there be new targets on the ranges?

*There are traditional gathering areas in some of the withdrawal areas; will we still be able to visit those locations and gather plants, pinenuts, etc.

*What will be the economic benefits of the proposal? How will the Tribe's benefit? The information provided shows that in 2015 there was a \$517.4 million economic benefit for Churchill, Lyon and Washoe Counties; this was for jobs, industry output, direct payroll of personnel, in state and local tax revenues, visitor spending, funds paid to landowners for agricultural easements and Federal Impact Aid to support local schools. There is NO economic benefit to the Walker River Paiute Tribe, even though we are located within 20 miles of the main base and have Tribal lands that are adjacent to Bravo 19.

*We have concerns for the already existing Wilderness Areas that are identified within the proposed land withdrawal areas. What will be the effect to the wildlife and lands in those areas?

*How will the increased flyovers affect the wildlife, air quality, etc.?

*How will water resources, wells, guzzlers, etc. be affected and monitored? *With the increased flyovers, should we be concerned about exhaust emission or fuel dumping; to

humans or wildlife? *Will there be a lot of night time flights? We are concerned about the noise.

*The maps provided were small and didn't' have identifying markers, boundary lines to get a good understanding of the land areas proposed for expansion. Our Tribe is concerned about how our Eastern boundary will be impacted by the increased "training" and "bombing". Historically, Naval and other pilots have continuously missed their targets.

In reviewing certain parts of the draft EIS, the Tribe would like to further comment after discussions with the BLM, USFWS and State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO). The Cultural Resource sections need to be reviewed by our cultural resource people; discussion needs to be held with the people that made the statements in this section. We need to discuss the many land issues with the BLM, ie. Wilderness Areas, land withdrawals, sage grouse habitat and treatment, etc. The sage grouse issue and the negative affects also need to be discussed with the USFWS as we have a great concern on how the animals and birds will be affected. The land in question has many cultural resource areas that we and other tribes are concerned about.

We are requesting that Tribal Cultural Resource Monitors from our Tribe be present and involved in any and all discussions regarding Tribal concerns. They should be paid by the Navy for their time in the field, for attending meetings and writing reports and all associated costs. It's important that all federal laws are following and all Tribal concerns are addressed.

Major concerns of our Tribe:

*The Navy has a long history of ignoring the Tribe's concerns.

*The Navy destroyed facilities on our reservation since the early 1940's.

*Access to areas on our reservation have been restricted due to "dangerous" conditions. Nearly 6,000 acres has been contaminated with live and inert ordnance.

*The Navy currently flies over our Reservation; we are concerned about the increased jet traffic, the increased use of Tribal airspace and the increased air pollution.

We are requesting that we begin meeting with Naval officials with decision making capabilities to discuss the EIS and the many historical and current concerns of our Tribe. The Fallon NAS has historical records and information on how they have negatively impacted our reservation for years.

In the early 1990's, the Tribe negotiated with Naval officials to attempt to come to resolution on the trespass (and damages) and contamination of Tribal lands. There were many decisions that were made during that time, but still no final decision was made. It's important to resolve those issues during this process so that the Navy can move forward with their needed training needs and the Tribe can be compensated accordingly for the many years of trespass, etc.

On March 30, 2016 a F/A 18 jet dropped two 25 pound bombs while performing a training mission in the vicinity of Bravo 19. Neither of these bombs were found and it is likely that they never will be. We were greatly disappointed that it took the Navy (David Halloran, Captain, US Navy Commanding Officer) until October 11, 2016 to send a report to our Tribe to explain the incident. As usual the Navy reports that: "There is no likely appreciable human or environmental health risk associated with the MK 76s due to the likelihood of the MK76s having buried themselves and the detonation of the spotting charges upon impact...." The letter further goes on to state: "We have performed a root cause analysis and determined that the off-range ordnance was due to human error in entering coordinates. We have reviewed our processes and implemented additional safeguards in an attempt to prevent further errors of this kind." These types of errors have been happening since the early 1940's.

The EIS should provide information on the history of munition issues on our Reservation. We assume that data is available on the frequency and extent of aircraft mishaps and of off-range ordnance, flares, or other military munitions landing on Tribal lands. This information should be included since it is central to the impact assessment. The Navy needs to disclose whether and, if so, how off-range UXO and munitions on the Reservation are being managed in compliance with the Military Munitions Rule. The EIS should explain how the Navy is complying, and would comply under the proposed action, with the Military Munitions Rule for munitions that land off-range on our Reservation. The Navy should also discuss whether the beneficial procedure outlined in the Native American Lands Environmental Mitigation Program (NALEMP) Implementation Manuel is applicable and whether any components of it are being implemented. Additional mitigation measures that could eliminate or minimize future ordnance and munitions expenditures on the Reservation with the Tribe.

The Tribe and Navy are currently revising and reviewing a MOA that is titled "Notification and Assistance Protocol for Addressing Off-Range Ordnance, Hazardous Material Incidents and Aircraft Mishaps that have Impact on Walker River Paiute Tribal Lands". This MOA has been utilized for years. It is necessary, because the Navy has been dropping bombs on our reservation for over 70 years.

A letter dated November 17, 2016 to Captain David Halloran was sent requesting that our Tribe be a Cooperating Agency on the EIS. We feel that our participation would be important to the development of the EIS, as the Tribe has historical knowledge with respect to the environmental impacts, including those to the land, air quality, water resources, plants, cultural resources and traditional resources located with the EIS study area. We are looking forward for the opportunity to participate in the EIS process with other cooperating agencies. In closing, the Walker River Paiute Tribe is looking forward to begin Government-to-Government consultation with decision making Naval officials so that we can discuss the many issues noted in the draft EIS as well as the issues that have impacted our Reservation over the many years.

An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories. The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense. 



The current bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s. However, newer-generation aircraft and weapons have outpaced the current capabilities of the Fallon Ranges.

In response to technological and tactical advancements, the Navy conducted a comprehensive analysis, referred to as the *Ninety Days to Combat* study, to determine the land and airspace needed to meet combat training requirements for modern aircraft and weapons systems. The analysis showed that the current size of the Fallon Ranges severely restricts the extent the Navy can use its weapons systems to train for combat. The proposed modernization would provide more realistic training capabilities while maintaining the safety of local communities.

The Navy's proposal to modernize the Fallon Ranges would include:

- · Renewal of the current public land withdrawal
- Land range expansion through additional withdrawal of public lands and acquisition of non-federal land
- Airspace expansion and modifications
- Upgrades to range infrastructure

The Navy is not proposing to change the level or type of training from what is stated in the 2015 Military Readiness Activities Fallon Range Training Complex EIS. Activities would be redistributed across the expanded ranges for more efficient use of the training space. No decisions about the proposed modernization would be made or any real estate actions taken until this EIS effort is complete.

Key among these concerns are access restrictions, adequacy of measures to identify and understand cultural resources in the proposed range areas, past harms to cultural sites, and the potential harm to burials. Let me assure you that the Navy takes these important concerns seriously.

In continuation of our ongoing government-to-government consultation, I respectfully request your participation in face-to-face meetings on December 18, 2019 at 1:00-4:00 pm in the Tahoe Hearing Room, at the Richard H. Bryan Building, 901 S. Stewart Street, Carson City, NV 89701. My goals for the meeting will be to outline specific Navy proposals to address the following:

- · An overview of cultural resources survey efforts to date
- A plan to partner with tribes to continue survey and identification efforts over time
- · An overview of how the proposed amended PA would be implemented
- The proposed support for tribal access
- · Protection of tribal burials
- A commitment to continue meeting with tribal leadership throughout the process

The Navy is committed to working in partnership with the tribes for the long-term. As Commanding Officer, I remain committed to improving the installation's relationships with the tribes and maximize the protection of cultural resources. Since our last meeting, I have reached out to the highest levels of Navy leadership for increased support to address these concerns. At

This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

- · Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foresceable future actions on the human environment. No decisions about the Proposed Action or any real estate actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Scoping Process

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

August 23, 2010

- Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- · Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- · Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions on the human environment. No decisions about the Proposed Action or any real estate actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Scoping Process

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

SUBJECT: FALLON RANGE TRAINING COMPLEX EXPANSION CULTURAL PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



Bryan Building, 901 S. Stewart Street, Carson City, NV 89701. My goals for the meeting will be to outline specific Navy proposals to address the following:

- A plan to partner with tribes to continue survey and identification efforts over time
- An overview of how the proposed amended PA would be implemented
- · The proposed support for tribal access
- Protection of tribal burials
- · A commitment to continue meeting with tribal leadership throughout the process

The Navy is committed to working in partnership with the tribes for the long-term. As Commanding Officer, I remain committed to improving the installation's relationships with the tribes and maximize the protection of cultural resources. Since our last meeting, I have reached out to the highest levels of Navy leadership for increased support to address these concerns. At

This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

August 25, 2016

Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;

- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

SUBJECT: FALLON RANGE TRAINING COMPLEX EXPANSION CULTURAL PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



As Commanding Officer, I remain committed to improving the installation's relationships with the tribes and maximize the protection of cultural resources. This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

- Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges.
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- · Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions on the human environment. No decisions about the Proposed Action or any real estate actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Scoping Process

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

The Navy is holding a series of meetings to discuss the project and to determine the type and scope of issues to be addressed in the EIS. Each of the seven scoping meetings will begin with a brief presentation about the project, followed by an open house with information stations staffed by Navy representatives.

SUBJECT: FALLON RANGE TRAINING COMPLEX EXPANSION CULTURAL PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.





- · A plan to partner with tribes to continue survey and identification efforts over time
- · An overview of how the proposed amended PA would be implemented

- A commitment to continue meeting with tribal leadership throughout the process

The Navy is committed to working in partnership with the tribes for the long-term. As Commanding Officer, I remain committed to improving the installation's relationships with the tribes and maximize the protection of cultural resources. This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is asking for your input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

August 25, 2016

- Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Scoping Process

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

SUBJECT: FALLON RANGE TRAINING COMPLEX EXPANSION CULTURAL PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION

As you are aware, Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) is proposing the modernization (Enclosure 1) of its current training areas in order to better train US Naval Forces in the use of modern weapons and the tactics of near military competitors. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) documenting the anticipated environmental effects of the proposal is being developed. Portions of that EIS will analyze the impacts of various alternatives on Cultural Properties. In order to perform these analyses, the Navy must first identify what cultural properties exist and assess their potential eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places. To date the identification efforts have consisted of background research and pedestrian inventories.

The Navy is requesting the assistance of regional tribal governments to assist in the further identification and evaluation of cultural properties potentially relevant to the EIS by placing the Navy in contact with tribal members who have an expert knowledge related to traditional cultural practices and sacred site locations. In asking for such assistance, the Navy promises to make every reasonable effort, consistent with applicable law, to withhold from public disclosure any specific information that the Tribe identifies as confidential, such as the locations of any sensitive cultural resources. Efforts to protect confidentiality would include, but not be limited to, utilizing any applicable exemptions or exclusions under the Freedom of Information Act-(FOIA). However, while encouraging the Tribe to take part in this process of identification and evaluation, I note that the Navy remains subject to the FOIA as a general matter, and the agencies with whom the Navy would likely need to share information provided by the Tribe in order to support eligibility determinations, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and the Bureau of Land Management are likewise subject to applicable laws regarding the release of government records (including, for the SHPO, any applicable state laws). Consequently, the Navy encourages the Tribe to seek the advice of its own legal counsel before providing culturally sensitive information to the Department of Defense.



Enclosed for your information and comment is a report entitled A Class III Cultural Resource Inventory of 14,062 Acres for the Proposed Land Withdrawal for Naval Air (NAS) Fallon, Churchill, Mineral, and Nye Counties, Nevada.

The inventory was conducted on lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management, Carson City District- Stillwater Field Office (12,643.5 acres), Bureau of Reclamation-Mid-Pacific Region (1,231.8 acres), Department of Defense-NAS Fallon (45.7 acres), and private lands (141.0 acres). The inventories were conducted to identify cultural resources located within proposed target and maneuver areas associated with Alternative 1 of the proposed NAS Fallon Range Training Complex Modernization Environmental Impact Statement (EIS).

A total of 202 archaeological sites were newly recorded or updated as part of the current . project (146 prehistoric, 38 historic, and 18 multicomponent).

The information contained within the report will be used to assess the impact of the actions associated with Alternative 1 (the "Proposed Action" as announced in August 2016). Please note that we are currently conducting further surveys to supplement this report with respect to Alternative 1, and that additional survey work may be required in the event that a different or modified alternative is ultimately identified in the EIS as the Navy's preferred alternative. Thus we may subsequently be providing additional information for your review; however, since this report provides the cultural resource information we have collected thus far, we would greatly appreciate your review of the report at this time. 

WHEREAS, NAS Fallon has consulted with the Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe, the Walker River Paiute Tribe, the Lovelock Paiute Tribe, the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe, the Yerington Paiute Tribe, the Yomba Shoshone Tribe, the Winnemucca Indian Colony of Nevada, the Te-Moak Tribe of Western Shoshone, the Battle Mountain Shoshone Tribe, the Duckwater Shoshone Tribe, the Fort McDermitt Paiute and Shoshone Tribes, the Reno-Sparks Indian Colony, the South Fork Band Council, the Washoe Tribe of Nevada and California, the Wells Band Council, the Summit Lake Paiute Tribe, the Inter-Tribal Council of Nevada, Churchill County, Lander County, the City of Fallon, the Executive Board the Bureau of Land Management, the Oregon California Trails Association, the Lincoln Highway Association, the Churchill County Museum, and the public.

NOW THEREFORE, in accordance with Stipulation X of the Agreement, NAS Fallon, the Nevada State Historic Preservation Officer, and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

Amend the first WHEREAS clause so it reads as follows:

WHEREAS, Naval Air Station Fallon, Nevada (NAS Fallon), provides for the air operations and training programs and related support activities, for the fleet, within the FRTC in the State of Nevada; and

AND

2. Amend the NOW THEREFORE clause so it reads as follows:

NOW THEREFORE, NAS Fallon, the Council, and SHPO agree that NAS Fallon undertakings within the FRTC shall be administered in accordance with the stipulations and definitions (Appendix 1) of this Agreement to satisfy NAS Fallon's responsibilities for individual undertakings, as defined at 36 CFR Part 800.16(y).

AND

Amend the statement under STIPULATIONS so it reads as follows:

NAS Fallon undertakings within the FRTC will be carried out in accordance with NAS Fallon's ICRMP, the 2009 State Protocol Agreement and the stipulations of this Agreement. When a conflict exists between the ICRMP or the 2009 State Protocol Agreement and the terms of this Agreement, this Agreement shall prevail.

AND

Amend Stipulation II.E to read as follows:

For all NAS Fallon undertakings that have the potential to affect historic properties on tribal lands in the State of Nevada, NAS Fallon will carry out its responsibilities pursuant to Section 106 of the NHPA in accordance with 36 CFR 800.

AND

Amend Stipulation XII.B to read as follows:

This PA shall expire on December 31, 2024. At least one year prior to the expiration date, NAS Fallon shall initiate consultation with the signatories to review the PA for renewal and/or possible amendment and extension.

AND

Amend Stipulation XIII to read as follows:

Execution and implementation of this Agreement evidences that NAS Fallon has satisfied its Section 106 responsibilities with respect to its undertakings within the FRTC.

AND

7. Amend Appendix 1 to include the following definition:

Fallon Range Training Complex: For the purpose of this Agreement, all lands under the control and jurisdiction of the Department of the Navy and the associated Special Use Airspace in the State of Nevada.

D.2 Draft Memorandum of Agreement Between the United States Department of the Navy Naval Aviation Warfighting Development Center and Naval Air Station Fallon and the State of Nevada, Nevada Division of Wildlife

(Note: This Draft Memorandum of Agreement is included as a model of a potential management agreement between the Navy and the State of Nevada concerning the proposed hunting program discussed in the Final Environmental Impact Statement for the proposed Modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex. Implementation of any such agreement is subject to congressional authorization of a land withdrawal associated with the proposed Modernization. Language reflecting the conditional nature of this potential agreement is highlighted in bold below.)

I. Subject: Cooperative Management for wildlife and habitat management activities on the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC) and joint implementation of a hunting program for those portions of hunt unit 181 within the confines of FRTC bombing range 17 (B-17).

Background: For over forty years, the Nevada Department of Wildlife (NDOW) and the Navy have had an excellent collaborative working relationship that has successfully facilitated management of habitat and game species on the FRTC. We are committed to continuing that relationship.

Purpose: This agreement is entered into for the purpose of wildlife management on the FRTC and implementation of a hunting program on FRTC range B-17. Specifically, this agreement will facilitate the joint implementation of a bighorn sheep hunting program located within the B-17 boundary. Additionally, this agreement will provide a process to facilitate NDOW access, via air and/or ground on the FRTC, for managing wildlife and habitat resources. It is the mutual intent of both parties that this agreement be implemented for the duration of (any period of withdrawal of public lands in established as a result of or otherwise in conjunction with the proposed modernization of the FRTC).

This agreement pertains to specific lands (**proposed to be administered**) by the Department of the Navy's Naval Air Station Fallon (NASF) and which are herein referred to collectively as the Area. The following two agencies from the Federal Government and State of Nevada are parties to this agreement:

- a. United States Department of the Navy, functioning through the Naval Air Station Fallon, and the Naval Aviation Warfighting Development Center (NASF / NAWDC), under the authority contained in the Military Lands Withdrawal Act, PL XXX-XX, herein referred to as Navy.
- b. The State of Nevada Department of Wildlife, herein referred to as NDOW, functioning through the Director and Nevada State Board of Wildlife Commissioners.

II. Authority:

- a. Applicable Federal Laws:
 - i. PL 85-337, Hunting on Military Installations, as amended (10 USC 2671)
 - ii. PL 105-85, the Sikes Act Improvement Act of 1997 (16 USC 670 (a) et seq.)
 - iii. PL 96-336, The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act of 1980 (16 USC 2901 et seq.)
 - iv. Refuge Recreation Act of 1962 (16 USC 460 et seq.)
 - v. PL 94-579, Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1968 (Title IV Range Management)

- vi. PL XXX-XX (Modernization Withdrawal)
- vii. Internal Security Act of 1950, Section 21 (50 USC 797)
- b. Applicable Executive Orders:
 - i. EO 11644, 42 USC 4321, Use of Off-Road Vehicles on Public Lands
- c. State Laws Applicable to Hunting:
 - i. NRS 501.100 (Wildlife Belongs to the People of the State of Nevada)
 - ii. NRS 501.105 (Hunting Wildlife in Nevada is permitted)
 - iii. NRS 501.181 (Duties of the State Board of Wildlife Commissioners)
 - iv. NRS 501.331 (Department of Wildlife Administers State Wildlife Laws)
 - v. NRS 501.351 (Applicable to Cooperative and Reciprocal Agreements)
 - vi. NRS 503.090 (Unlawful to Hunt Except during Open Season)
- d. Other Documents:
 - i. Slate Mountain Nelson Bighorn Sheep Reestablishment Plan (1995)
 - ii. NAS Fallon Integrated Natural Resources Management Plan (2014)
- III. Land Description: Lands (proposed to be included within the Area) include Navy owned land and federal lands withdrawn for military use through P.L. XXX-XX, and are collectively called the Fallon Range Training Complex. The entire Area is included in this agreement for the purpose of wildlife and habitat management access by NDOW. Lands identified for the purpose of the bighorn hunting program are described in the following text. The attached map (figure 1) is a depiction of the proposed baseline hunt areas, access routes, and campsites. Please note that the attached map serves as a baseline for an annual evaluation and designation of access routes, hunt areas, and campsites, based on current safety and mission constraints. Not all roads, campsites or hunt areas may be accessible every year; however, it is the Navy's intent to provide as much access as possible, within the constraints of safety and mission requirements.
 - a. Bravo-17 Bombing Range: Legal description: is included as an appendix to this MOA. B-17 is located approximately 35 miles southeast of NAS Fallon, and is situated south of Highway 50 and east of State Route 839. B-17 spans across Fairview Valley, Little Bell Flat, and extends south into the Gabbs Valley. Bighorn Sheep have the potential to occupy the mountainous terrain inside of and adjacent to B-17, including the Fairview Peak and Slate Mountain areas as well as the Monte Cristo Mountains (see map). Please note that approved Bighorn Sheep Hunt Areas will be determined on an annual basis during the annual hunt program review with NDOW coordination. Hunt areas will be determined based on safety and range management considerations. Much of this described area was withdrawn from the former jurisdiction of the Bureau of Land Management.
 - Shoal Site: Legal description: Portions of Townships 15 &16 North and Ranges 31 ½ & 32 East. The 7405-acre shoal site consists of public lands in the Sand Springs Range, approximately 30 miles southeast of Fallon and two miles west of State Route 839. The Navy is responsible for surface management of this site.

IV. Recitals:

Whereas NAWDC has use of Navy Administered Lands for military training purposes, the NASF Public Works Department and BLM, in cooperation with NDOW, manage wildlife habitat on behalf of the Navy; and

Whereas NDOW, under the laws of the State of Nevada, provides a system of control, propagation, protection and regulation of all fish and wildlife in Nevada; and

Whereas Public Law XXX-XX (proposes to modify the B-17 Boundaries and increase the total acres by 212,662 acres) to the south and east of the previously existing B-17 boundary. New lands include bighorn sheep habitat on Slate Mountain and Monte Cristo Mountains that were previously managed by BLM and open to the public for hunting ; and

Whereas the Navy (would control access) to these lands under PL XXX-XX, Title X; and

Whereas the Navy (**would operate and manage**) the ground and airspace in the Fairview Peak, Slate Mountain Area, Monte Cristo Mountains, and the Shoal Site on Sand Springs Range, for military purposes, under authority from the Federal Aviation Administration and PL XXX-XX Title X; and

Whereas the Navy under PL XXX-XX, Title X (**would close**) these lands to public access due to safety and military training requirements as necessitated by the Navy mission. The Navy (**would**) allow limited hunting access for portions of B-17 and unrestricted access to the Shoal Site when such activity does not interfere with Navy mission and is conducted under the regulatory authority of NDOW; and

Whereas, the mutual desire of NDOW and the Navy to collaborate for the common purpose of protecting, enhancing and managing bighorn sheep, mule deer, pronghorn, and other wildlife species on the FRTC species for the best interest of the people of Nevada and the United States. It is also their mutual desire is to coordinate and hold an annual hunting program on the B-17 range of the FRTC for the best interest of the people of Nevada and the United States.

Therefore, it is mutually agreed that:

V. Responsibilities:

- a. Joint Responsibilities of the Navy and NDOW:
 - i. Consistent with the Navy's objective in providing national defense, in support of national security interests abroad, and in the interest of ensuring public safety, both parties shall cooperate in the administration of the B-17 hunting program and the conducting of wildlife surveys, wildlife habitat improvements, enhancements, restoration activities, and installation and maintenance of water developments within the Area.
 - ii. Both parties will meet jointly, as needed but at a minimum twice per year, to discuss matters relating to the hunting program and wildlife or habitat management. NDOW will be responsible for calling and coordinating one meeting prior to the start of the hunting season and one meeting after the conclusion of the hunting season. This MOA and the hunting program work plan will be reviewed annually, and updated as necessary using adaptive management techniques. All changes will be coordinated and mutually approved by the Navy and NDOW.
 - iii. All hunting on the Navy administered lands will be conducted with the concurrence of the Navy and will be conducted in accordance with federal law (10 USC Section 2671) and applicable state game laws and regulations. NDOW will enforce applicable hunting laws and facilitate required briefings with the tag holders, their hunt parties and/or guides prior to the mutually agreed upon B-17 hunt start date.

- iv. The hunt shall be scheduled annually in accordance with Commission Regulation season dates and hunting quotas, for a period of 15 consecutive days within the established hunt season, to the extent compatible with mission requirements. The hunt will be scheduled around/between major training evolutions. When determined feasible and compatible with mission training, the Navy may allow more than 15 days for the hunt. The Navy may require a halt to all hunting activities on the Area at any time due to training schedule or readiness requirements changes. While every effort will be made not to interfere with the hunt, the essential mission and safety will assume priority.
- v. The Navy and NDOW will work together to identify and define any and all hunt areas during hunt program reviews. Changes to hunting areas should be based on safety requirements and mission compatibility.
- vi. B-17 is a restricted area. In consideration of safety factors, ground and flying activity restrictions in the Hunt Areas will be determined by the Navy and communicated to NDOW. These restrictions will be published in the Annual Hunting Program work plan.
- vii. The Navy will notify tag holders of the tentative open hunt period by August 1 each year and will confirm with tag holders by September 1. After September 1, if any change is required with respect to the pending hunt season, the Navy will make every effort to provide the new information in a timely manner to the hunters and will strive to provide this information at least two weeks prior to the hunt season.
- viii. The Navy will provide Range Safety Training to explain access requirements, hunt boundaries and safety protocols for the Area to those individuals who will be accessing the range during the hunt. To accommodate all tag holders, training materials will be available online, and a face-to-face Range Safety Briefing will be provided at least one day prior to the opening day of the managed access hunt. Each year, the Navy and NDOW will coordinate the date, time and site locations and jointly conduct these briefings.
- ix. Upon completion of three (3) years of full implementation of the managed access bighorn hunting program, NDOW and the Navy will meet to re-assess the hunting program. This re-assessment will be conducted in part to determine if additional big game hunts on the FRTC may be logistically feasible and compatible with mission activities.
- x. Trapping or transplanting of bighorn sheep shall be conducted only with the joint concurrence of, and in coordination with, the Navy and NDOW staff.
- xi. NDOW may request access to the Area to monitor, maintain, or construct water developments as necessary. The Navy will review and assess the proposed locations of new water developments for mission compatibility. The Navy will grant such access, so long as actions are compatible with current operations as scheduled.

- xii. Off-road vehicle use in the Shoal Site and B-17 is controlled by the Navy. Vehicles may only be used on designated access roads and trails. Within the B-17, hunt areas, access routes, and campsites will be designated and provided to hunters and their hunt parties. No off-road vehicle access is authorized. Violators of Navy access policies or NDOW hunt regulations will be removed from the Area, and may be subject to loss of hunting privileges. Violations of applicable policies and regulations may also lead to modification or termination of the overall hunt program.
- xiii. Nothing contained in this MOA is intended to modify, in any manner, other agreements with public agencies, or to modify rights granted by treaty, or otherwise, to any Native American Tribe(s) or member(s) thereof.
- xiv. Nothing in this MOA may be construed to obligate the United States or the Department of the Navy to any current or future expenditure of money in advance of the availability of appropriations for such purposes from the U.S. Congress.
- xv. Supplemental agreements may be developed as required by both parties to address other program requirements. This agreement does not supersede any agreements involving the parties that are now in force.
- xvi. All media activities attendant to wildlife management activities on the Area will be coordinated through NDOW and the NASF Public Affairs Office.
- xvii. Point of Contact for Navy briefings to NDOW and tag holders and all associated coordination and scheduling will be NAWDC Range Operations at 426-2102.
- xviii. This agreement may be modified or amended by mutual agreement of the authorized representatives of the two Parties. This MOA may be terminated by either Party by giving at least 30 days written notice to the other Party. However, the parties agree that termination should be viewed as a last option, and that they will seek to meet and/or confer as needed and to the extent practicable to try to avoid termination of this agreement. When disputes or unique situations create stalemates at the working group level, the issue will be elevated to the signatories of this MOA for resolution. The MOA may also be terminated at any time upon the mutual written consent of the Parties.
- b. Navy Responsibilities Within the limitations of the assigned military mission and the availability of funds and manpower, the NASF/NAWDC agrees to:




Figure 1: B-17 Bighorn Hunt Program Baseline*

 - i. Collaborate with NDOW to designate and establish hunt areas, access routes, camp areas and range access requirements for participants on an annual basis, which will be published in the annual hunting program work plan. Note: The attached map (figure 1) is a depiction of the proposed baseline hunt areas, access routes, and campsites. Please note that the attached map serves as a baseline for an annual evaluation and designation of access routes, hunt areas, and campsites, based on current safety and mission constraints. Not all roads, campsites or hunt areas may be accessible every year; however, it is the Navy's

intent to provide as much access as possible, within the constraints of safety and mission requirements.

- ii. Develop and implement range access requirements for participants during the hunting season, which will be published in the annual hunting program work plan.
- iii. Ensure the Range Operations Support / Maintenance (ROS) Contract conducts "a sweep" of the intended access roads and identified areas to facilitate safe ingress in and egress out of the respective Weapons Danger Zone(s) on an annual basis.
- iv. Provide access to authorized agents and employees of NDOW, and to authorized tag holders and their parties, subject to compliance with NASFINST 5560.1D.
- v. Administer mission parameters to allow for minimal interference with the hunt program, with the understanding that the operational mission will take priority in a conflict situation. In that event, the Navy will notify NDOW and follow-up in writing or via electronic mail.
- vi. Administer criminal background checks for all members of hunt parties and enforce applicable firearm policy specific to the hunt program.
- vii. Provide conservation law enforcement officers or federal officials to enforce Federal regulations and Navy policy during the hunt period. Conservation law enforcement officers will work in coordination with state game wardens who will enforce state game laws.
- viii. Schedule range time for NDOW to operate approved aircraft for the purposes of aerial wildlife surveys, habitat management actions, or during emergency events related to wildlife, within Navy special use airspace in accordance with Navy Range Operations doctrine and policy.
- ix. Restrict flying activities as practicable and consistent with operational requirements, over the Hunt Areas during the designated hunting period.
 Restrictions will follow Navy Range Operations doctrine and flying restrictions will be published in the applicable FRTC Range Schedule.
- x. Limit access by Department of Defense (DoD) ground training parties within the designated hunt areas during the hunt period to prevent interference and promote safety. The Navy will have access to Range B-17 and the hunt areas for range management, emergency, or law enforcement purposes as required.
- xi. Notify NDOW and all hunters on range in the event of an emergency during the hunt. Depending on the emergency, NDOW/hunter access may be restricted.
- xii. Notify NDOW of problems with water developments located within the Area for the benefit of bighorns and other wildlife, and repair to proper functioning condition any water developments that are confirmed to be damaged by military activities.

- c. NDOW Responsibilities Consistent with its primary objectives and responsibilities and within the availability of funds and personnel, NDOW agrees to:
 - i. Periodically survey wildlife to estimate population trends and distribution in order to set harvest quotas and evaluate management needs. During a disease event or other wildlife emergency within the Area, NDOW may request access to respond to the situation. NDOW shall coordinate field activities with the NAWDC Range scheduling office.
 - ii. Coordinate each year with the Navy those NDOW-produced documents that reference hunting season dates and quotas. NDOW shall coordinate these activities with the NAWDC Range scheduling office.
 - iii. Share hunt information, survey reports, and spatial data with the Navy for hunts and wildlife surveys conducted within the Area. Specifically, NDOW will annually share bighorn sheep hunt tag numbers for unit 181, hunt results, and population estimates and general location data for big game herds found within the Area.
 - iv. Make available game wardens to carry out a random patrol in the designated Hunt Area during the B-17 hunting period. Game wardens will enforce state game laws and monitor hunting activities in cooperation with federal conservation law enforcement or Federal officials.
 - v. In conjunction with the normal season-setting process, NDOW will assist the Board of Wildlife Commissioners to establish hunting seasons, tag quotas and consistently therewith, issue state hunting licenses and tags for wildlife species within the designated hunt area and approved for hunting by NDOW and Navy within B-17.
 - vi. In coordination with the Navy, NDOW will help administer the Range Safety Briefing for B-17 bighorn hunts. NDOW will inform the public through their website of the restrictions and requirements to access Navy administered lands for the unit 181 bighorn sheep hunt. NDOW will also contact applicable tag holders, including Statewide tag holders, to inform them of the restrictions and requirements for access on Navy lands. NDOW will provide information that directs the hunters to contact the Navy in order to initiate access approval. NDOW will coordinate with the Navy to ensure hunter notification is complete and successful while meeting personal information protection policy.

This appendix includes a summary of the public involvement and stakeholder outreach activities conducted by the United States (U.S.) Department of the Navy (Navy) during the scoping period and the public review and comment period for the Draft Fallon Range Training Complex Modernization Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). The scoping period was held from August 26, 2016, to December 12, 2016. The Draft EIS was released for public review November 16, 2018, for a 60-day public comment period. The public comment period was extended by an additional 30 days, to close February 14, 2019.

The purpose of public involvement during the public scoping period was to (1) notify and inform stakeholders and the public about the Proposed Action; and (2) provide opportunities for the public to comment on the scope of the analysis, including environmental issues and potential viable alternatives. The purpose of public involvement during the public review and comment period of the Draft EIS was to (1) notify and inform stakeholders and the public about the Proposed Action and the release of the Draft EIS, and (2) provide the opportunity for the public and stakeholders to comment on the Draft EIS.

Outreach and involvement efforts were conducted in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act and Navy guidance.

E.1 Project Website

A project website was established to provide the public with project information and to accept comments electronically. The project website address is https://www.FRTCModernization.com; the website went live August 26, 2016.

The website address was included in the *Federal Register* Notice of Intent to Prepare an Environmental Impact Statement and To Announce Public Scoping Meetings and the *Federal Register* Notice of Public Meetings. It was also included in newspaper advertisements, stakeholder letters, tribal letters, media releases, public service announcements, fliers, and postcard mailers.

Public notifications, fact sheets, the executive summary of the Draft EIS, maps, frequently asked questions, technical reports, a project video, posters, and various other informational materials are available on the project website and will be available throughout the course of the project.

E.2 Scoping Period

E.2.1 Public Scoping Notifications

The Navy made significant efforts to notify the public to maximize public participation during the scoping process. A summary of these efforts follows.

E.2.1.1 Federal Register Notices

The public scoping period began with issuance of a joint Notice of Intent and Notice of Scoping Meetings published in the *Federal Register* August 26, 2016. The Bureau of Land Management published a Notice of Withdrawal Application in the *Federal Register* September 2, 2016. At the request of the public, the Navy extended the public scoping period to December 12, 2016, and a Notice of Extension of Public Scoping Period was published in the *Federal Register* November 10, 2016. *Federal Register* notices can be found in Appendix A (Federal Register Notices).

E.2.1.2 Newspaper Advertisements

Display advertisements were placed in local newspapers to advertise the public's opportunity to comment on the scope of the analysis. The advertisements included a description of the Proposed Action, the address of the project website, the duration of the comment period, and information on how to provide comments. The newspapers and publication dates are listed in Table E-1. An example of the advertisement is shown in Figure E-1.




Figure E-1: Newspaper Announcement for Scoping

FALLON, Nev. — The U.S. Navy is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS), pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act, to evaluate potential environmental effects associated with modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex. The Fallon Range Training Complex is the Navy's premier aviation training complex. It is located in the high desert of northern Nevada, 65 miles east of the city of Reno.

The Navy proposes to modernize the Fallon Range Training Complex, which would include land range expansion through additional land withdrawal and land acquisition, airspace modifications, and public land withdrawal renewal. The modernization is required because advances in warfare technology have outpaced the size and configuration of the ranges, hindering the Navy from fully sustaining realistic aviation and ground training.

The Navy's proposed action includes renewal of the existing 202,859-acre public land withdrawal that expires on Nov. 5, 2021; the withdraw and reserve for military use of approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land; acquisition of approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land; expansion of associated Special Use Airspace, as well as reconfiguration of existing airspace; and modification of range infrastructure to support modernization. The aviation and ground training to be conducted in the modernized Fallon Range Training Complex would be of the same general types and at the same tempos analyzed in Alternative 2 of the Final EIS for Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada (completed in December 2015).

The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the United States Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

The Navy published a Federal Register notice on August 26 stating that it would conduct the EIS on both renewing the existing public land withdrawal, which covers 202,859 acres, and the withdrawal and reservation for military use of another 604,789 acres of public land to expand the existing range. The Navy's authorization to use its existing acreage expires in 2021. Based on the environmental analysis, the Secretary of the Interior will make a recommendation to Congress on the proposed withdrawals. However, Congress, not the Secretary, will make the final decision on both the requested extension and proposed expansion.

As a first step in the EIS process, the Navy will hold seven public meetings on the proposed extension and expansion of the Fallon Range Training Complex. The BLM, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS. During the EIS, the Navy will consider existing uses of the lands. For instance, the Bureau of Reclamation and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service manage some of the lands. In addition, the Pony Express National Historic Trail, managed by the BLM and the National Park Service, runs through both the existing and proposed expansion areas. An expanded Fallon Range Training Complex would also overlap with portions of the Stillwater Range Wilderness Study Area (WSA), the Job Peak WSA, and the Clan Alpine Mountains WSA, which are all managed by the BLM. The U.S. Navy expansion would also overlap sage grouse habitat, the current Vegas to Reno Off-Highway Race course, numerous right-of-way corridors, and several grazing allotments. Current authorized uses of the lands can continue during the segregation.

The two-year segregation removes the expansion lands from all forms of appropriation under the public land laws, including the mining laws, the mineral leasing laws, and the geothermal leasing

laws. Valid existing rights at the time of the segregation will be honored. The action is require under section 204(b)(1) of the Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976. Much of the existing Fallon Range footprint is already withdrawn from these laws.




Figure E-5: Stakeholder Scoping Notification Letter

E.3 Summary of the Scoping Meetings and Topics Discussed

Scoping comments were submitted in three ways:

- Written letters (received any time during the public comment period)
- Comments submitted at a scoping meeting (written or oral)
- Comments submitted directly on the project website (received any time during the public comment period)

In total, 338 people attended seven public scoping meetings. Twenty-one written comment letters and 15 oral comments were submitted at the meetings.

E.4 Draft Environmental Impact Statement Public Review and Comment Period

E.4.1 Draft Environmental Impact Statement Public Review and Comment Period Notifications

The Navy made significant efforts to notify the public of the release of the Draft EIS and the dates and locations of public meetings to maximize participation during the public review and comment period process. A summary of these efforts follows.

E.4.1.1 Federal Register Notices

A Notice of Public Meetings was published in the *Federal Register* November 15, 2018, and a Notice of Availability of the Draft EIS was published in the *Federal Register* November 16, 2018. At the request of the public, the Navy extended the public comment period to February 14, 2019, and a notice announcing the extension of the public review and comment period was published in the *Federal Register* December 27, 2018. *Federal Register* notices can be found in Appendix A (Federal Register Notices).

E.4.1.2 Newspaper Advertisements

Display advertisements were placed in local newspapers to advertise the notice of availability of the Draft EIS, the public meetings, and the public review and comment period. The advertisements included a description of the Proposed Action, the public meeting dates and locations, the address of the project website, the duration of the comment period, and information on how to provide comments. The newspapers and publication dates are listed in Table E-5. An example of the advertisement is shown in Figure E-8.




Figure E-9: Newspaper Announcement of the Comment Period Extension for the Draft EIS




Figure E-14: Stakeholder Letter for the Draft EIS Notice of Availability and Public Meetings




Figure E-16: Postcard Mailer for the Comment Period Extension for the Draft EIS (Back)

E.7 Comments on the Draft Environmental Impact Statement

Throughout the public comment period, a total of 1,466 unique comments were received. Public comments on the Draft EIS were submitted in three ways:

- Written or e-mailed comments (received any time during the public comment period) (393 comments).
- Comments submitted at a public meeting (written or oral) (written: 21 comments [number included in the above unique comment total]; oral: 59 comments).
- Comments submitted directly on the project website (received any time during the public comment period) (1,014 comments).

Additionally, form letters (with 584 signatures) and form postcards (with 290 signatures) were also received from various nongovernmental organizations.

Comments on the Draft EIS were received from 6 federal agencies, 13 state agencies, 22 county agencies, 89 nongovernmental organizations and business groups, 15 Native American tribes, and 447 private individuals.

Each comment was reviewed and categorized into specific resource areas or topics. One comment may include comments on multiple resource areas or topics. Appendix F (Public Comments and Responses) contains a summary of the comments received on the Draft EIS and the Navy's responses.

E.8 Final Environmental Impact Statement and Record of Decision

This Final EIS includes updates and revisions to the Draft EIS, a complete set of all substantive comments received on the Draft EIS, and the Navy's responses to such comments (Appendix F, Public Comments and Responses). Response to public comments may also take other forms, including correction of data, clarifications of and modifications to analytical approaches, and inclusion of additional data or analysis.

A 30-day waiting period will follow the issuance of the Final EIS. The Navy will sign a ROD after consideration of the Final EIS and public comments. The Navy will publish a *Notice of Availability of the ROD* in the *FR*; distribute the ROD to Indian Tribes, agencies, interested parties, and local newspapers; and post it on the FRTC EIS website. The ROD will document the Navy's final decision on the Proposed Action (to include identifying an action alternative as a proposal to be submitted to Congress for action), the rationale behind that decision, and any commitments to mitigation and monitoring. Congress will then review the Navy's proposal and ROD and will consider legislation for the proposed land withdrawal.
